Tax Collections. August was probably the busiest month in the history of the tax office. The collections amounted to nearly \$175,000, or close on two-thirds of the year's taxes. According to a change made in the Assess ment Act at the last session of the Legislature, the collectors have to add 5 per cent on all taxes after May 1, and if not paid within twelve months from that date the treasurer adds 5 per cent moremaking a total addition of 10 per cent. The money taken in during August will be sufficient to pay back the amounts borrowed by the city to pay its way during the year. The saving to the ratepayers in bank discounts and discounts allowed after second installment will be between \$4,000

and \$5,000.

Johnston Pleads Guilty. The charges of selling liquor without s license and assaulting a constable, preferred against Benj. Johnston, proprietor of the cafe at Springbank, came be-fore Squires J. B. Smyth and R. F. Lacey today. They were not venti-lated, however. Johnston pleaded guilty to the liquor charge, and the magistrates fined him \$50. He will have to pay all costs. The second charge was dropped.

A New Scheme. City Engineer Graydon has forwarded the following self-explanatory letter to the City Council:

"Permit me to suggest an idea for the provision of a fund for the construction of macadam roads in this city. You are aware that a great proportion of the streets are 132 feet wide-a width totally un-

necessary and a burden to the city to keep up. A roadway 40 feet wide for driving is ample in any city. I would suggest that 33 feet on each side of these streets be sold to the property owners abuting thereon, and the moneys received from the sales be used for the construction of a good roadway. It may be said that some would not purchase, but if you could get the owners of one block to buy on both sides, then use the moneys so obtained for the making of a macadam road in that block, this would be an inducement to purchase and would provide them with a

good roadway as well." The engineer further stated that the money invested in the property would be less than the frontage tax for which owners would be assessed.

A Delicate Question.

A correspondent questions the advisability of Judge Meredith going on the rota for trying Provincial election petitions, on the ground of his relationship to the leader of the Opposition. It is a case in which it is difficult to lay down hard and fast lines. The interest of Mr. W. R. Meredith in election trials affecting the size of his following in the Legislature is no doubt large, perhaps as large or larger than that of the parties to the trial, We do not know whether it is such an interest as a court of law would take cognizance of. If the leader of the Opposition were an immediate party to the suit the fraternal relationship might not of itself be regarded as an objection, but if political and family sympathy were combined it is probable that the judge would himself prefer not to be placed in a position which could not fail to be embarrassing. It seems to be a question of expediency, not of law, not even of propriety. If there are plenty of judges from whom a selection may be made for trying these cases, there is no reason why the question should be raised at all. Mr. Justice Meredith would probably feel relieved if he were not called upon to perform this particular duty, and it is just as well that suitors should not

only receive tull justice, but should have on the even an ill-founded reason for sup posing that they will receive anything ler We should put the matter on the grounds, not on the ground of any de that the judge in question would desi be anything else than completely far impartial.—[Toronto Globe.

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
