BURIED SIX DAYS!

Experience of the Two Men Rescued From

Cleveland's Waterworks Shaft.

After having been imprisoned in the Cleveland waterworks tunnel for six days without food and exposed to the noxious gases which had killed two of their companions, Adam Kest and John Eugene, two crib employees, who had been given up for dead, were rescued alive. Their escape from death was miraculous. After brave Plummer James had given up his life in the fire accident last week in a vain search of the tunnel for possible survivors, the hunt for the missing men was abandoned. The waterworks men decided gave it out that no one, alive or dead, was left in the tunnel. It was 2 o'clock in the afternoon when laborers clearing away the debris at the

burned crib heard rappings upon the pipe which conveyed air into the tunnel. They rapped back and received several more responsive signals. Then, hoisting a blanket upon a stick they signalled a passing fish tug and dispatched it for the life-saving crew and a long rope. Upon the tug's return Foreman Vandusen and Watchman Cunningham were lowered down the shaft into the tunnel. Fifty feet from the shaft they found Kest and Eugene, nearly up to their waist in water. Both were weak, but when hauled up the shaft appeared stronger than their two rescuers, who were so overcome by the foul gas that they had to be sent to the hospital, as well as Kest and Eugene.

UNDER ARMS!

Lord Kitchener's Report of the Situation

in South Africa.

Great Patience Still Required "To See the Inevitable

End of Insensate Resistance"—British

Losses Up to Date.

London, Aug. 21.—In a dispatch, dated July 8, and detailing the condition of affairs at the front at that time, Lord Kitchener says:

"There are no more than 13,500 Boers now under arms. Although they are not able longer to undertake extensive operations, their apparently inexhaustible supplies of food enables them to maintain an obstinate resistance without retreating anything or defending the smallest portion of this vast country."

"The wearing down process is necessarily slow, rendering the employment of a large number of troops still necessary. Great patience is still required to see the inevitable end of an insensate resistance, which, while it cannot affect the result, has become unjustifiable in prolonging the war and the sufferings of women and children."

Since the dispatch was written the losses of Boers have brought their forces down to about 11,000.

A WEEK'S WORK.

Lord Kitchener's weekly report from Pretoria, dated Aug. 19, shows that 64 Boers were killed, 20 were wounded, 24 were made prisoners and 30 surrendered during that time. The prisoners include Landrost, Steyn, the Vrededorf, and Commandant De Villiers, father of Mrs. Schalkburger, wife of the acting president, and Commandant Brytenbach, of Lilliefontein.

London, Aug. 21.—The monthly return of casualties in South Africa, issued by the War Office, shows that our total losses to July 31 are:

CONVOY CAPTURED.

Vereeniging, Aug. 21.—A party of Bloemfontein, were found on Bloemfontein Farm, near Parys, by Col. Rawlinson.

After a short resistance the enemy bolted, and a chase ensued, which resulted in the capture of the Boer convoy of 25 loaded wagons, together with 1,200 cattle and a large number of horses and sheep.

Col. Rawlinson captured 25 Boers. Middelburg, Aug. 21.—On the 6th inst. a patrol captured a Boer belonging to Theron's commando, with two horses, a rifle, a quantity of dynamite detonators, and also contrivance for exploding dynamite under passing trains.

Commandant Scheepers shot an interpreter on a farm six miles west of Steytlerville.
