Great Patience Still Required "To See the Inevitable End of Insensate Resistance" --- British Losses Up to Date.

Great patience is still required to see the inevitable end of an insensate resistance, which, while it can not affect the result, has become unjustifiable in prolonging the war and the sufferings of women and children." STORIES OF THE WRECK!

Capt. Ferry's Clear Account of the Disaster.

More Would Have Been Saved-Bravery of the Women-Eleven Stowaways Shut Up and Drowned.

Victoria, Aug. 20.—The arrival of the Farallon yesterday added little to the knowledge already possessed of the causes of the unfortunate accident whereby the C. P. N. flagship Islander went to her doom.
