The Vacancy in the Senate.

The death of the late Hon. John O'Donoghue leaves a vacancy in the Senate which will probably be filled by some prominent Roman Catholic in this Province. The name of Mr. Thomas Coffey, of this city, has been proposed, and his appointment would find cordial approval in this community, where he has spent a lifetime. We feel a special pleasure in suggesting Mr. Coffey as he is a veteran publisher, who has made his paper, the Catholic Record, the most successful of the kind in Canada. He stands high in the estimation of his fellow-citizens. They know him as a broad-minded man, who has used his influence to promote harmony and good-feeling among all classes and has identified himself closely with the interests of the city. Mr. Coffey has been a life-long Liberal. He is one of the most representative Roman Catholics in Ontario, and would be a credit in the Senate to his co-religionists. His long and useful career would be worthily crowned by such an honor and his experience and strong ability would make him a valuable public servant.

A Noble Project.

The Assuan dam is the most stupendous project of the kind ever undertaken for the benefit of a subject people. It makes Egypt more than ever a shining example of British imperialism in its moral and civilizing aspect. The British occupation of Egypt seems to be clearly a case of manifest destiny. There is not the slightest doubt that Gladstone was sincere when he declared in 1882 that Great Britain would withdraw from the country, but succeeding governments have been unable to redeem the pledge through sheer force of circumstances. British occupation has made a new Egypt. The former despised and tax-ridden fellaah has been lifted up, the credit of the country has been restored, and its wealth and production have increased almost magically. To turn Egypt adrift at this tide in her affairs would be a crime against humanity. The fellaahs would be practically delivered into bondage again; the country's credit would fall with a crash, and the development which promises to raise Egypt into something like her former greatness would be arrested. There would be a return to the anarchy and rapacity which characterized native rule, and which the British twenty years ago stepped in to correct. France is the only nation that would welcome the change. She refused to co-operate with the British in maintaining order in Egypt, after the suppression of the outbreak in Alexandria, and left Great Britain to undertake alone the task of reconstruction. Since then she has persistently accused Great Britain of bad faith in refusing to withdraw, but this may be put down to national pique over the impolicy of the French Government in 1882, and the success of British administration. The French holders of Egyptian bonds would be the foremost defenders of British occupation, knowing that native rule would spell financial ruin.

The reconstruction of Egypt has been directed by the genius of Lord Cromer. This great empire-builder is the real ruler of the country. The Khedive is the nominal head, but he is the mere puppet, pulled by the strings of British policy. Lord Cromer has placed Egyptian finance on so sound a basis that it is in a position to bear the colossal burden of the Assuan dam project, the cost of which is estimated at \$125,000,000. The expenditure will be immensely repaid, as the impounding of the river will insure regular crops on a vast area, which is rendered arid when the water in the Nile is low. An immense impetus will be given to agriculture, and it is expected that the increase in the production of cotton will make Egypt a serious rival of the United States.

The work, which dwarfs that of the Pharaohs, has been undertaken to benefit a race which has no claim on the British people. The world cannot show the equal of this benevolence on the part of a civilized power toward an inferior nation. It is by such achievements that the British race stands justified in its imperial mission.

The Cattle Embargo.

The announcement that the C. P. R. will accept cattle at any of its stations for export to Great Britain via St. John, N. B., is welcome news. Great Britain having placed an embargo on all cattle shipped from New England ports, owing to the prevalence of the foot and mouth disease, the Grand Trunk was debarred from shipping Canadian cattle to Portland, Me., for export, and handed over its cattle trains to the Intercolonial at Montreal to be run to Halifax or St. John. The C. P. R. still expected to carry cattle to St. John on its short line across the northern part of Maine, but this was prohibited by the Canadian Minister of Agriculture. President Shaughnessy was nettled, and issued an order refusing to accept any cattle for shipment from any point in Ontario and the

West, because the company could not have the full haul to the seaboard. This was a heavy blow at the cattle business and created consternation among the dealers. President Shaughnessy criticised, as unjust and unwarranted, the action of the Canadian Department of Agriculture in prohibiting shipments through Maine, but with a candor that does him credit, he now makes amends, and admits that the Minister's policy was a wise one. He has decided to make the best of the situation by rescinding his previous order and accepting cattle at C. P. R. stations to be transferred to the Intercolonial for shipment to Halifax and St. John. Canada knows by experience that the British Board of Agriculture would not hesitate a moment to extend the embargo to cattle from Canadian ports if any infection appeared in shipments from this country. Hon. Sydney Fisher determined to take no chances, and his good intentions are cordially recognized by President Shaughnessy, who says in an interview:

"The Government looked at the matter from the broad standpoint of the shipment of cattle from Canada. The Minister was at the outset confronted with two alternatives. One was to list cattle from the infected States for export, or to wait for the action of the imperial authorities. It was a matter for the imperial authorities to say what action they would take, and when they shut out Portland and the State of Maine, it was obviously a very serious thing for Mr. Fisher, on his own responsibility, to say that he would allow cattle to be shipped from St. John that had passed through the State of Maine. Had it been found that disease had broken out in the case of a single shipment, there would have been a chorus of protests from the British cattle raisers, and the result would have been an order prohibiting all cattle shipments from Canada. For the safety of the Canadian trade Mr. Fisher took the action he did, but that in no way alters the serious aspect of the affair, so far as this country is concerned."

The effect of the embargo has been to throw a great deal of traffic to the Intercolonial, with corresponding benefit to the port of Halifax, where the facilities for cattle shipments are in danger of being overtaken. The loss is very serious for the C. P. R. and C. T. R. The utmost vigilance is needed for the protection of the Canadian cattle interests, but the Minister of Agriculture is alive to the situation.

One View of Temperance.

[Goldwin Smith.] "I do not believe in prohibition, but I do believe in the regulation and restriction of the saloon, which is the only seat of any serious evil. But there are two things to be considered.—First, the danger of having an illicit for a license trade, and you must not do injustice to the saloonkeepers. Temperance is a very fine thing, but so is justice. It is unreasonable to expect to extirpate at one legislative stroke a taste coeval and coexistent with humanity. You can't carry out criminal legislation against a practice which, however one may view it, nine-tenths of the people don't believe to be a crime. I think the result on the whole is satisfactory. It points against prohibition and in favor of a more strict regulation of the saloon."

Smallpox in Addington.

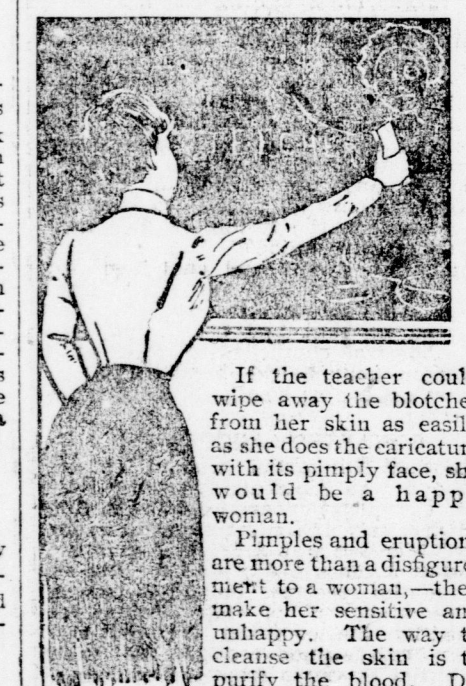

Campau, of Detroit, who is also proprietor of the Chicago Horseman, the trotting organ of the west. He also secured the account this morning for \$500, and the whole is considered a good bargain. Mr. Campau has not yet made up his mind what course will be pursued by the Spirit, but it will probably be continued as it is for a time and then be merged into the Horseman. The Spirit of the Times is seventy years old. For many years under Porter, Wilkes and Bucy it was prosperous, but of late had a precarious existence.

Pretty Still Whale Story.

San Francisco, Dec. 9.—The steamship Sierra, which has arrived from Australia, reports that on Nov. 4, while steaming at 16 knots, the vessel struck a whale, breaking its back and sending it to the bottom. The whale's body stuck on the vessel's stem. The steamer was slowed down, but the whale's carcass remained fast and was dislodged only by backing the steamer. The latter was not damaged.

Questions Answered.

KOMOKA. What is the amount of a deceased person's income that is exempt under the succession duties act and what is the rate of duty? Ans.—Income is not subject to the act which applies to the estate left by such person. When its value after payment of debts exceeds \$100,000. When estate exceeds \$100,000 and passes in whole or in part to father, mother, husband, wife, child, grandchild of other lineal descendant or daughter-in-law or son-in-law of deceased, this duty is \$2.50 for every \$100 in value. If value of estate exceeds \$200,000 the duty is \$5 for every \$100. Where value of estate exceeds \$100,000 and passes to grandsons, brothers, sisters, uncles or aunts or their descendants this duty is \$5 per \$100, and if to others next of kin or to strangers this duty is \$10 for every \$100. When this legacy or share of such property does not exceed \$200 to any one person, the same is exempt from duty.

MORTGAGE.

A buys land from B, paying part and giving a mortgage for the balance. Who is entitled to hold the deed? Ans.—B.

SUGARBEEETS.

How many pounds will one bushel of mangels or sugarbeets weigh? Ans.—A bushel of beets, which will give you an approximate weight for average purposes. The legal weight of a bushel of beets is 60 pounds.
