WHERE MONEY WAS SPENT PREPARING STATEMENT

Board of Works Will Likely Be Hauled Over the Coals By the Council.
The statement of the money expended by the board of works, which Ald. Richter asked for at the last meeting of the council is being prepared, and will be submitted to the council on Monday night.

Already a score of typewritten pages have been prepared, and there are more to follow.

There are three streets that will be of particular interest.

One will be Richmond street north, from Oxford to Huron. There was a motion to initiate a pavement on that street, but the council did not pass it, owing to opposition by property-owners. However, the board of works went ahead and gravelled and rolled this street, at a cost of \$1,957.40.

Another is Cathcart street, from Weary to Bruce. From what can be learned, there are but eleven houses on this street, but the committee expended \$1,713.18 on the roadway. It is claimed that many more streets needed money spent on them, and some of the aldermen cannot see the necessity of expending that sum there.

A third street, from Askin to Bruce, cost \$1,659 to repair. This was needed, of course, but the complaint is that too much money has been expended in South London, and that other portions of the city should have been considered.

In any event these streets will cause some debate at the council, and an explanation of the expenditure will be asked for.

FAMOUS AULT PAINTING 'SHADOW OF THE CROSS'

Wonderful Picture Is On Exhibition in Heintzman's.

The famous Ault painting, "The Shadow of the Cross," on exhibition at Heintzman's, is attracting a great deal of attention, and yesterday and today large crowds attended the exhibition.

It is well worth any person's time to see this unusual painting. It was not finished owing to the death of the painter, but it undoubtedly would have been a wonderful work of art had the author been able to finish it.

The painting is of "The Christ," and the face is one of calm serenity of "The Man of Sorrows." The coloring is perfect, the browns and drabs of the Saviour's mantle standing in striking contrast to the far-off blue hills and the opalescent sky.

But the startling feature of the picture is the shadow. When the light is turned off a cross appears on the canvas. There is no chiaroscuro about it whatever—no double screen at all, simply a phenomenon that none can explain. The effect is most impressive.

A MUSIC DEPARTMENT FOR WESTERN UNIVERSITY

Education Committee Has Reported Favorably On the Matter.

At a meeting of the board of governors held yesterday afternoon in Mayor Beattie's office, some routine business was transacted.

A communication was read from the managers of the Western University Gazette, asking for a grant of \$75 towards their publication. This matter was laid over until the report of the finance committee was presented at the December meeting.

Capt. Murphy reported that the education committee had taken up the advisability of adding a music department to the Western, and they had considered it favorably. It would add to the prestige of the university, and would be of much benefit to the conservatory. However, after a short discussion, it was decided to lay the matter over until the next meeting, and in the meantime the educational committee will make further inquiries and report to the board.

Owing to the fact that Mr. T. H. Smallman could not be present, the financial statement was not submitted.

DELAY IN OPENING OF LEGISLATURE

The Provincial House May Not Open Until Late in March.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—Rumors of a delay in the calling of the session of the Legislature until March, instead of January, as was expected, were current around the parliament buildings today, and March 20 was even mentioned as a possible date.

Sir James Whitney has announced already that the work on the west wing will not postpone the assembling of the members beyond the time when the Government considers it best to call them together, but the venture was made in one direction today that the 1911 and 1912 sessions might both be held in March in order that the Legislature might be meeting late enough in 1912 to pass in review the redistribution measure of the Dominion Government, insofar as it affected the Ontario divisions, as well as to deal with the census returns, which will be delayed in reaching the public owing to the later date, June, in which the work begins next year.

There will be some changes made by this province before the next local elections is being taken for granted in both political circles.

LIBERALS GAIN
Will Control Next Cuban Congress From Present Indications.

Havana, Nov. 2.—Fairly complete election returns indicate that the Liberals will control the next congress, although the Conservatives have made gains. According to the returns received, twelve Conservative and 21 Liberal congressmen have been elected. Nine seats are uncertain, but of these six probably will be Liberal.

AIM TO KEEP OUT POOREST LABORERS

Greater Restrictions Are Placed on Those Coming Into Canada.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Nov. 2.—Greater restrictions were yesterday placed on immigration from the United States, when the monetary requirements from prospective entrants were doubled. As it now is, any person more than 18 years of age entering Canada may be asked to produce \$50. Between the ages of 5 and 18 years, the amount now necessary is \$25. The regulation will be in effect until March 31, 1911. Its purpose is to keep out poor laborers.

CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETY WAS UNSATISFACTORY

Scheme of Sir Christopher Furness Did Not Work Out Well.

[Associated Press.]
Washington, Nov. 3.—Antagonism on the part of trade unions to the profit-sharing idea of co-partnership relations between employer and employee, has resulted in the discontinuance of an interesting departure in shipbuilding, undertaken in 1908 by Sir Christopher Furness with about 3,000 employees, according to a report received here from the United States consul-general at London.

Though guaranteed a four per cent return on their investment in addition to a five per cent share in the profits, the members of the co-operative organization by a majority vote recently dissolved. The idea was conceived as a possible solution for trade disputes. In its stead there has now been established what is known as the "works" council, a board whose function is the promotion of friendly con-

TORONTO MAN HELD FOR DARING BURGLARY

Police Are Also Holding Young Girl Who Eloped With Him.

Baltimore, Nov. 2.—The police of this city believe they have in custody a genuine "Raftles" in the person of Thomas H. Barnett, alias Kemp, of Christie street, Toronto, Ont., who is held here on the charge of having robbed the residence of Howard Kellogg at Buffalo on Sept. 3. On Barnett's person and in the room where he has been living, the police found a large quantity of jewelry and other plunder, and everything else that goes to make up a burglar's kit.

Also in custody is Miss Frances Tomlinson, aged 18 years, who is said to be a daughter of a railroad official living in Toronto. Miss Tomlinson and Barnett eloped from Toronto, and until today she believed that they had been legally married in Niagara Falls, N.Y. That this had been a mock marriage developed after Barnett's arrest, when he begged that a minister be sent to marry him to the girl, and she was willing that this be done until Barnett confessed, the police say, to a number of burglaries.

Miss Tomlinson's father has been notified of his daughter's plight. The couple figured in the newspapers some time ago. While they were living in Newark, N.J., Miss Tomlinson accidentally shot herself with a revolver. Barnett, who is 23 years old, told the detectives that he made it a rule to wear full dress whenever he made his burglarious expeditions, so that, if discovered, he might reasonably claim to have accidentally entered the wrong house.

"BLACK HAND" STOPPED.
Toronto, Nov. 2.—The Italian drama "The Black Hand," which was scheduled to appear at Finnish Hall on Dec. 1, has been stopped by Staff Inspector Kennedy on the grounds that there is no theatre license for the place. It has no proper fire exits, nor asbestos curtain.

Frank Motta, the police court interpreter, who translated the posters, said yesterday that the play was probably one which would inflame the minds of the Italians.
