

AN AVIATORS DUNKIRK

Planes From Sea In
But Little Damage
Done.

Dunkirk, Feb. 2.—The correspondent of the Daily Mail in Northern France writes: "Six German aeroplanes made a raid on Dunkirk last night. They approached the town from the sea, and nothing was known of their presence until bombs were dropped at about half past eight o'clock. More than sixty bombs, either explosive or incendiary, were dropped, but the damage done was insignificant. "The bombs fell all over the town, which is another proof that they were dropped at haphazard. Notwithstanding the darkness, and the fact that French guns were firing at the invaders, several allied aeroplanes got away and went in pursuit of the Germans. One of them chased an aviator to the Belgian frontier."

MINOR EARTHQUAKES

Avezzano Still Affected—One Lowers Level of Lake.

Avezzano, Feb. 2.—Earth disturbances of the nature continue at Avezzano, and the most important was the lowering of the level of Lake Paterno by feet after a vortex had appeared in the centre. This is interpreted as indicating a subterranean eruption, which, subsiding, drew into the earth an immense volume of water from the lake.

LONDON MAN'S COUSIN IS KILLED IN ACTION

Henry Taylor, 140 Ridout Street, South London, Receives Word.

Word that a cousin has been killed in active service in France, was received yesterday by Henry Taylor, 140 Ridout Street, South London. His cousin, Lieut. P. G. Chaworth-Masters, of Anstey Hall, England, had been at the front several months with the King's Royal Rifle Corps. No details of how the young officer had met his death were contained in the letter, other than that he was killed while in action with his regiment on the heavily-massed Russian troops, and the other end of the line recoils from the advancing German army.

MILLIONS OF POLES IN WORSE CONDITION THAN THE BELGIANS

Misery Is Unknown To the
Outer World—Country
All In Ruins.

Petrograd, Jan. 1.—(Correspondence.)—In spite of the fact that several commissions are at work investigating the devastation which Poland has suffered during the German invasions, the acute misery of its millions of inhabitants still goes unrecorded. The destruction is so universal that it hardly seems possible that it was the work of human agents. Poland normally was a pleasant, rolling country, not unlike the American middle west; fertile agriculturally, developed, productive and prosperous, with its landscapes checkered with well-wooded farms and patches of wood. It is now black and scorched, almost every house is in ruins, and the mutilated roads are full of half-starved, half-frozen people, who have no homes and no possibility of escaping from the charred remnants of what once were their habitations. The line of fugitive peasants is like a long, black cord, knotted in places where they have assembled in groups to consider the best way to escape. But at one end escape is cut off by the heavily-massed Russian troops, and the other end of the line recoils from the advancing German army.

HOPE FOR ASSISTANCE.

"The picture is drawn by Prince Radziwill, a member of Poland's oldest and noblest aristocracy, who has come to Petrograd from his home in Minsk to devise some practical method of assisting his unfortunate countrymen. "I am afraid," said Prince Radziwill to the Associated Press, "the world has been so busy giving its help to unfortunate Belgium that our country, which is so far off from the western world, cannot expect a full measure of sympathy. The tragedy of Belgium came first, and that, of course, makes it seem more important; the Polish tragedy is not yet finished."

KRUGER'S GRANDSON CHARGED WITH TREASON

Pretoria, via London, Feb. 2.—(10:15 a.m.)—Pieter Grobler, a member of the Parliament of the Union of South Africa, and a grandson of Paul Kruger, has been committed for trial on a charge of treason.

COURTMARTIAL FOR 71.

An official announcement issued here sets forth that 71 burghers who declined to serve against the Germans in the Southwest have been ordered court-martialled. Five hundred others, who professed willingness to join their commands, but urged various reasons for exemption, will be sent back to their home districts, where local boards will inquire into the facts.

TURKS IN FLIGHT BEFORE RUSSIANS

Division Routed and Staff of
Officers Captured, Says
Tiflis Report.

London, Feb. 2.—The Times Petrograd correspondent says the Tiflis correspondent of Novoe Vremya reports great successes on the part of the Russian Caucasian army. "The only Turkish division which escaped the fate of the three shattered corps has been routed in the direction of Oltu," a message says. "At the outset the Russians took the divisional staff quarters by storm, capturing the general and his entire staff of twenty officers, who offered no resistance. In the region of Tabriz the Turks were utterly incapable of checking the Russian advance."

FOUGHT IN BLIZZARD.

"The Russians repelled furious Turkish charges and consummated the defeat of the various units. The battle took place during a blizzard, the Russian troops marching over a snow-covered mountain pass. They seized valuable stores of provisions, ammunition and military supplies, as well as several guns. Almost simultaneously they gained a victory over the Turks in Azerbaijan."

PERALANG CHANGE TONE.

"The Persian authorities, who had hitherto been hand in glove with the Turks, and guilty of great tactlessness toward Russia, promptly changed tone, after our victorious advent and the flight of the Turks. "The successful movement of the Russians in Khois is being continued. The situation of the Turkish troops is critical, the Kurds angered by the failure, began to loot their comrades in arms. Panic reigns in Trebizond and the inhabitants are fleeing from the city."

PASSED OVER VETO

Havana, Feb. 2.—The Senate last night passed over the presidential veto the amnesty bill designed to effect the release of Ernesto Asbert, former governor of Havana Province, who was convicted of killing Chief of Police Riva in 1912, and sentenced to twelve years' imprisonment. The House previously passed the bill.

BOMBARDING FURNES

London, Feb. 2.—The Daily Mail's correspondent telegraphs from Northern France: "The Germans are continuing to bombard Furnes. The Allies' aviators discovered two carefully hidden German guns, which had damaged the town. The Allies' artillery at once destroyed them. So far no monuments have been destroyed."

DIED AT INGERSOLL

Mrs. Roach, Aged 87 Years, Was Highly Respected Resident.

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Continued From Page One RUSSIANS FORCE ENEMY

Berlin and south of Borjow, a large force of artillery developed active operations against our positions with very considerable forces. The German offensive was distinguished by great tenacity, advancing in close ranks, strongly supported from the rear. "After having concentrated a violent fire in the morning upon that region, the fierceness of the German offensive compelled some of our units to retire to the second line of trenches."

Then Driven Out.

In the meanwhile a counter-attack from another detachment of our forces drove the enemy from all the trenches and positions, inflicting upon them enormous losses. "Simultaneously with this attack on Borjow, the Germans delivered a series of ferocious assaults against our front between the villages of Goumlie, Bourdard and Mogheli. These attacks were supported by very heavy artillery fire. Up in midday of January 31 every one of these assaults were driven back by us, some by our rifle fire, and some with the bayonet. But between midday and 2 p.m. of January 31 the Germans were successful in occupying a part of our trenches. In this they were helped, largely by an energetic and sustained artillery fire."

German Success Slight.

"A little after 2 o'clock we undertook a general counter-attack. This was successful, and as a result of it the enemy, the evening of January 31, retained but a little portion of our first-line trenches, together with a certain outpost in the country. It can be said that the successes of the Germans the day of January 31 in the vicinity of Borjow were relatively insignificant compared to the losses we inflicted on the enemy with our artillery fire, our counter-attack, and our bayonet charges."

Enemy's Loss Heavy.

"According to reports from our military chiefs, the Russian artillery inflicted immense damage on the Germans. Our guns dispersed dense gatherings of German infantry, and it reduced their batteries to silence; this made it possible for us to resist their fierce attacks with ease. "The fighting in the Carpathians continues. In spite of the reported participation of fresh Austrian troops, which up to the present time have not actually appeared on our front, we were successful in repelling every endeavor of the enemy to assume the offensive in the vicinity of Mount Beskid and Mount Wyszokow, and we are continuing to advance with success along the front from Nijnia Polianka to Loundovsk.

Many Killed and Wounded.

"It should be related that during the night of January 30-31 at a point near Molino a Russian detachment advanced upon the enemy and dislodged them from certain positions which threatened the heads of our trenches. In this encounter our men used the bayonet freely, and we captured some machine guns. "Local inhabitants relate that the enemy after the Lipno-Debrzyn fight used 60 wagons to remove their wounded. German prisoners captured in the region of Borjow are authority for the statement that between January 24 and January 30, the Germans on a front near Borjow 1½ verst long (a little less than one mile), lost over 6,000 men in killed. The wounded were numerous."

In the Carpathians between January

25 and January 29 on the front between Nijnia Polianka and Loundovsk we captured 78 officers, 4,065 soldiers, four pieces of artillery and ten machine guns."

PIRACY.
