KING'S DAUGHTERS HAVE

HAD A VERY BUSY YEAR

Miss Ella Davis was Re-Elected President at Annual Meeting.

There was an excellent attendance last evening at the annual meeting of the city union of King's Daughters, held in St. George's Church, West London, the four circles of London being well represented.

Miss Ella Davis presided and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. Canon G. B. Sage, rector of the church.

Miss Louie Gahan, the retiring secretary, gave a most interesting resume of the year's work, telling of the great amount that has been accomplished in philanthropic and other ways. A satisfactory report was presented by the treasurer, Miss French.

The program feature of the evening was an address by Miss Davis, nursing sister, C.A.M.C., who in a vivid manner pictured her experience in military hospital work, both in France and England. Going overseas with the first contingent in September, 1914, Miss Davis and a hundred other nurses spent their first month in England in St. Thomas Hospital, Old London, where Florence Nightingale received her training.

In the course of her address the speaker told of the provision made for ministering to the spiritual as well as physical welfare of the sick and wounded.

Special praise was given to the Red Cross work of the Canadian women, these supplies always being very much appreciated for their excellence, she declared.

One suggestion given was: "We would have very much appreciated whisk brooms, which could be used to greatest advantage."

A vote was given by Misses Boles and Stone.

With the exception of the secretary, all officers were re-elected as follows: Honorary president, Mrs. Tilley; president, Miss Ella Davis; 1st vice-president, Mrs. G. B. Sage; 2nd vice-president, Miss Margaret Brown; 3rd vice-president, Miss Thompson; corresponding secretary, Mrs. F. R. Haidley; recording secretary, Miss Ina McBride; treasurer, Miss French.

At the close the Golden Links Circle of St. George's Church, as hostesses, served delicious refreshments, over which a social hour was enjoyed.

LONDON NURSE BACK

AFTER YEAR IN EGYPT; SAYS NATIVES LOYAL

Germans Tried to Stir Them Up But Failed, Says Miss Hilda Stuart.

Miss Hilda Stuart, formerly a staff nurse at Victoria Hospital, who has been on overseas service at Cairo, Egypt, for over a year, has returned, and is visiting with her mother, who now resides in Woodstock.

On her arrival in Egypt she was sent direct to a Red Cross hospital in the suburbs of Cairo, where she remained from July until January.

During that time she had numerous British soldiers as patients, some suffering from wounds received in battle but for the most part medical cases.

The British soldiers, she said, even when badly wounded, were good patients; always cheerful and happy, although suffering a great deal from the intense heat. During May of this year a hot wave struck the place and the temperature registered 118 degrees in the shade, and in the desert it went as high as 150 degrees. This hospital held 700, and was practically full at all times.

From January until the end of May Miss Stuart was stationed at an officers' convalescent hospital in the heart of the city. This had formerly been the old German agency at Cairo, but had been transformed into a hospital, and made an ideal place.

The natives of Egypt are a very quiet people and have little to say about the war, Miss Stuart stated, although she added that she had little chance to meet them in her opinion they were loyal to the British.

German aeroplanes flew over the city and dropped messages telling the people that they were coming on the next day in order to stir up the natives and cause confusion, but in this they were disappointed, as the natives paid little attention, going about their usual duties unconcerned.

Although the natives are very interesting, they are very dirty, Miss Stuart said. What impressed her most on her arrival in Egypt was the way the people slept after the noonday heat. Their stories were all about the natives lay down in doorways, on the sidewalks, and, in fact, any place they could find a shady nook or corner.

Miss Stuart returned to England on an Australian troopship that had formerly belonged to Germany. It had been the Derfflinger, not the German battleship of that name, but a merchant vessel that had been captured by the British early in the war.

Many sandstorms visited Cairo while she was in the city, and one of the worst that had been seen for years took place while she was there. Miss Stuart is not sure whether she will go back, but is willing if necessary.

Miss Stuart considers that her eleven months in Egypt, in spite of the hardships she had to endure there, were well worth while.

LONDON BREWERIES TO OPEN QUEBEC AGENCIES

Will Be Able to Ship Products Back From There.

It is quite certain that the local breweries will establish agencies in Quebec.

No warehouses have as yet been secured, but they will be. In this manner their output can be shipped to Quebec, and ordered from there, to be delivered to any part of Ontario. The ultimate consumer will have to pay the freight going and coming.

"We have not established agencies as yet," said Hugh Labatt, "but it is probable that we will do so. Other Ontario concerns are doing it. Ottawa breweries are in a favorable position, as they can team their stuff over to Hull, and ship it from there."

SALE WITHDRAWN

Auction of Labatt Home Does Not Bring Sufficient Bids.

The Labatt home on Queen's avenue was offered for sale by auction yesterday afternoon, but was withdrawn with no bidders. Later parts of the property were offered, but the offers did not approach the reserve bids, so the parcels were also withdrawn.

Hugh Labatt stated that there were many inquiries after the sale, and it is possible that the property may be disposed of privately. No information was forthcoming as to the amount of the reserve bids.
