LONDON NURSE BACK AFTER YEAR IN EGYPT; SAYS NATIVES LOYAL

Germans Tried to Stir Them Up But

Falled, Says Miss Hilda Stuart. Miss Hilda Stuart, formerly a staff nurse at Victoria Hospital, who has been on overseas service at Cairo, Egypt, for over a year, has returned, and is visiting with her mother, who now resides in Woodstock.

On her arrival in Egypt she was sent direct to a Red Cross hospital in the suburbs of Cairo, where she remained from July until January. During that time she had numerous British soldiers as patients, some suffering from wounds received in hattle, the most part medical cases. The British soldiers, she said, even shen badly wounded, were good patients; always cheerful and happy, although suffering a great deal from the intense heat. During May of this year a hot wave struck the place and the temperature registered 118 de-grees in the shade, and in the desert it went as high as 150 degrees. This hospital held 700, and was practically


