Lloyd George Tells Parliament Force Cannot Crush Bolshevism-Believes Country C an Be Saved by Trade-Declare No Peace Until Barbarism Ceases.

LONDON, Feb. 10.—The speeches with which the new session of the House of Commons was launched today will not make history. Mr. Lloyd George, William Adamson and Sir Donald MacLean spoke for the Government, Laborites and Liberals respectively.

The premier gave a long explanation of the Government's Russian policy, but refused to be drawn by the other speakers to the topic of revising certain 'unworkable features" of the peace treaty. Dealing with the burning question of economy, the premier recommended the familiar specific of increased production. His remarks on Ireland gave no new information regarding the measure which is soon to be introduced.

Colonel Sidney Peel (Coalition-Unionist), who made the reply to the address rom the throne, said, "It will be a grievous disappointment to us if the United States finds itself mable to take part in the work of reconstruction. But she must be master in her own house, as we are in ours."
