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LONDON TP. CLERK WILL REPLY TO MAYOR'S ADDRESS

Miss Mary Grant To Officiate At Meeting Today.

TORONTO, Aug. 30.—The Ontario Municipal Association will open a three-day meeting in Toronto tomorrow. Mayor Church will deliver an address of welcome, to which Miss Mary Grant of London Township will reply, after which President M. B. Holmes of Athens will deliver his address.

Subjects for discussion tomorrow are: taxation for municipal and school purposes; and exemptions due to public ownership; legislative interference with municipal contracts in dealing with the natural gas situation in Ontario; the legislative franchise; civil liability; and public and private matters, and municipal legislation in 1921.

Assessors of the municipalities will meet to discuss the assessment law. The rural section on Thursday will discuss administration of the dog tax law.

On Friday will be discussed administration of the Ontario highway laws and superannuation of municipal officials. On Friday afternoon a representative of the Ontario hydro-electric commission will speak on the introduction of power in rural municipalities and Hon. H. C. Nixon, provincial secretary, will also deliver an address.

CORN-BORER IS FOUND IN ESSEX

Port Stanley Govt. Scout Finds Pest Near Kingsville.

WINDSOR, Aug. 30.—The European corn borer has been found about three miles east of Kingsville, according to Arthur Finnamore, scout for Port Stanley, head of a scouting party which has been working in the field west of Chatham. Mr. Finnamore was in Windsor today. As a result of finding the pest he left with his party for Leamington tonight, where a search of the district will be made.

Officially Examined.

"There is no doubt that the insect we found was a corn borer," Mr. Finnamore said. "The insect was sent to the Government laboratory at Port Stanley, where it was examined by G. Crawford, Government entomologist, and pronounced to be a corn borer. While here during the examination a report of the district in which it was found, on instructions of William Keenan, who has charge of the various scouting parties now in the field in Ontario."

Only One Borer Found.

According to Mr. Finnamore only one corn borer was found in Essex County, though he stated that the corn borer was not uncommon in the district. A number of dahlias which were being held for shipment across the border. According to the United States embargo cut flowers cannot be shipped across the line unless they are accompanied by a certificate pronouncing them free from insects.

It was pointed out by Mr. Finnamore that the farmers of the county would be doing themselves and others the best service by seeking any suspicious-looking insects to Mr. Crawford at Port Stanley, who could immediately decide as to the origin of the insect. In this way the public could be informed of any inroad of the pest, and the Government would be enabled to better fight it. Mr. Crawford's mailing address is P. O. Box 300, Port Stanley. Provincial and Dominion Governments are co-operating in their efforts to stamp out the pest.

Miss McLean from Kenora will belong to the English staff. Miss Patterson will take classes in senior English.

To Collegiate.

Mr. James Cole has been transferred to the Collegiate staff from the public school to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Macmillan. Mr. Cole will take the public school manual training. Herbert Graham for physical drill and Mr. McCamus for classics will be the new appointees.

Miss Hildy of St. Mary's has been appointed the domestic science teacher. There are few changes on the public school staff.

James Dale, thought to have been suffering from a nervous mind, is reported as having been missing from Teeterville since yesterday afternoon. Little information has been issued regarding the disappearance of the man. He was staying with J. E. Mitchell at Teeterville and mysteriously faded from the scene. The disappearance was reported to the police. He is tall, fresh complexion, dark hair beginning to turn grey, and aged about 55 years. The local department is making every effort to locate him in this district.

LOSES LEG UNDER TRAIN AT WINDSOR

WINDSOR, Aug. 30.—Philip S. Harries of Sharon, Pa., had his right leg severed below the knee by an M. C. R. train last night. He was found near Tower 4 on the M. C. R., which was close to the point where the M. C. R. crosses Howard avenue. Dr. C. F. Fuller was called and had him removed to Hotel Ilex, where he is reported to be making a good recovery. He suffered slight injuries to his head in addition to the amputation of his limb.

It is believed that he was either trying to board or dismount from a moving train when he lost his hold and fell beneath the train. He has been living in Detroit for several weeks.

DANIEL EDWARDS IS DEAD AT CHATHAM

CHATHAM, Aug. 30.—The death occurred last night at the Public General Hospital of Daniel Edwards, aged 80 years. Deceased, who had been ailing for some time, lived with his niece, Mrs. J. E. The remains will be taken to Rothwell, where interment will be made in the Bothwell Cemetery on Wednesday.

Extravagant Demands of Unemployed Cause Trouble

LONDON, Aug. 30.—(By Canadian Press.)—Payments to the present hosts of unemployed by the different authorities in the poorer quarters of London are causing the payers of local taxes extreme disquiet. In the boroughs of Islington and Camberwell it is alleged the authorities are making grants exceeding what the recipients earn when working, and even more generous than in Poplar, where councillors are threatened with imprisonment through inability or contumacy in levying local taxes.

The unemployed in Hackney and Shoreditch are demanding even more extravagant payments, and in Woolwich the unemployed are demanding "adequate relief." They define such relief as equal to the wages of unskilled arsenal workers, and threaten if the terms are not granted to enter the workhouse in a body and remain until their claims are satisfied.

Essex Conservatives Unable To Agree on a Candidate

Question Will Be Put Up To Premier Meighen When He Speaks in London Tomorrow—Only Hope of Winning Lies in Redistribution.

WINDSOR, Aug. 30.—Unable to agree on a candidate to oppose William C. Kennedy, member for North Essex, the Tory executive committee will confer with Premier Meighen when he speaks at London on Thursday night.

The younger element in the Tory camp along the border is pressing the claims of William R. Wollast of Walkerville, who was beaten by Major J. C. Toulme for a seat in the Legislature. Against this pull for the Walkerville man is a campaign among certain sections of the party for the nomination of Edward B. Winter, a former mayor of Windsor, who succeeded from the Liberal party during the last election. The ultra Conservatives are making themselves heard for Col. R. H. Castelain.

Col. Castelain, however, it is said, has ambitions in another direction. He is hoping, it is said, that the life of the Meighen administration may be prolonged sufficiently to allow of his appointment to the senate. Unless this comes to pass, friends allege he may be a very disappointed man.

A member of the Tory executive, in making this announcement this afternoon, admitted that the only hope of the Tories to wrest the seat from Mr. Kennedy lies in the plans of the Premier for a redistribution. This may result in the rural districts of North Essex being cut off from Windsor and adjacent manufacturing centres.

May Take Vote of Ratepayers On Project For Central Market

Estimates To Be Secured On Cost of New Market Building—Gas Works Site Is Favored As a Location.

ST. THOMAS, Aug. 30.—A central market to meet the convenience of householders residing in all parts of the city was again advocated by the members of No. 3 committee tonight, and the location favored was the area now covered by the gas works.

A resolution was unanimously passed that a special committee ascertain the estimate of the cost of a new market building, and the committee be instructed to prepare a bylaw to be voted on by the people on the question whether a new site for a market should be secured or a new structure be erected on the present location.

Favors Removal.

It was stated to the committee that Chairman Lemon was in favor of removing the gas works to a larger area near or outside the limits of the corporation.

Should a central site be decided upon the land covered by the Horton market would revert to the heirs of the late Mayor Horton, who placed the market site in the hands of the city.

The Municipal Council of the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals advised No. 4 committee tonight on the requirements of a proper pen for the couple of bears in Plimfore Park Zoo. The minimum space for confinement was placed at 30x20 feet; equipped with boulders, an old tree and a pool six with running water. A separate pen for sleeping quarters, 10x8, with a high, floor raised to allow for drainage.

The secretary, J. W. Wilson, came to St. Thomas accompanied by Dr. Campbell.

A special committee was named to ascertain the conditions are necessary to place the zoo in a healthy and sanitary condition, and an estimate of the costs. The finding of the committee will be submitted to the ratepayers at the January elections, and the main question, whether or not the corporation will continue to maintain a municipal zoo. The chairman reported that he had appointed Mrs. Darlington supervisor of the women's public lavatories.

Home For Incubables.

The committee passed a recommendation to the council that a deputation be named to confer with the county council with a view towards co-operating with the city council to establish a home for incubables for St. Thomas and Elgin County.

WILL HELP RAILWAY BEAUTIFY GROUNDS

Horticultural Society To Co-operate With L. and P. S. Management.

ST. THOMAS, Aug. 30.—The Horticultural Society will co-operate with the London and Port Stanley Railway in beautifying the waste and weedy land between the railway station and Mill Creek bridge. The M. C. R. will be asked to clean up a patch of a disreputable working area north of the Empire mills. The entrance from Wellington street to the gladiolus trial bed and the patch between it and the tracks will be leveled and the tracks and a roadway constructed. The society are removing all the unsightly things in the neighborhood of the proposed improvements. The local society will send a batch of blooms to the exhibition at Guelph, which opens tomorrow.

An appeal has been made by President Bennett for funds to assist in meeting the excess liabilities due on account of the heavy disbursements with financing of the recent show.

Cliffed With Auto.

Climbing up the hill in the Ross street subway tonight, the wagon of Dr. Frayne, Chestnut street, was hit in the rear by a fast-going auto. The occupants, Frank de Frayne, Robert Gilmore and George Mories, were thrown overboard with a stove, which was taken home. The stove was smashed to bits, and Mr. Mories' arm was seriously bruised. The number of the auto was secured by one of the party, and a complaint laid against the owner at police headquarters.

Theft of a Rug.

A local youth was arrested this afternoon by Constable McKee, after a warrant charging him with stealing a rug from the inventory of Dr. McKee, at Talbot street, valued at about \$18. The rug was found in possession of a man in the east end of the city, who states he got it from the boy for \$2.

Council Meets Wednesday.

Labor Day falling on Monday, the meeting of the finance committee, usually held on that night, has been postponed to Tuesday evening, and the regular session of the council will be held on Wednesday night.

U. L. Appleford, Napleton, promoter of the Oxford Milk Products Company, who is being treated at Woodstock Hospital for sleeping sickness, is recovering.

WOULD COST \$222,000.

WINDSOR, Aug. 30.—City Engineer M. E. Brian submitted his estimate of the cost of widening Sandwich street to the city council. He believes it will cost \$222,000. Ald. E. Hopper fathered a resolution asking Walkerville to join with Windsor in widening that part of the thoroughfare in the adjoining town.

NEW DISTRICT PLANNED.

WINDSOR, Aug. 30.—J. E. Benson, inspector of public schools, and W. R. Edson, who will be principal of the Prince Edward School, are conferring on the organization of the new district. Owing to the fact that 1,000 will be accommodated, there are more arrangements than usual to be made.

DORCHESTER MAN KILLED WHEN CAR RUNS INTO DITCH

Joseph Hardiman Breaks His Neck—Two Others in Car Escape.

DORCHESTER, Aug. 30.—Joseph Hardiman of Dorchester was killed, and his son Edward, and son-in-law, Frank Scattergood, injured and badly shaken up, at 8:30 o'clock last night, when Hardiman's car ran into a ditch on the outskirts of the village.

Mr. Hardiman was returning home from the country and was driving over a washed-out culvert, which was being filled in. He overtook the edge of the culvert, and the car went over, throwing the occupants out.

Medical aid was immediately summoned, but Hardiman died before help could reach him. His neck was broken. Mr. Hardiman is survived by his wife, one son, Edward, and four daughters, Mrs. F. Scattergood, Mrs. Isaac Walton, Mrs. A. Allen and Mrs. R. Clark, all of London, and Miss Gertrude, at home. The funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

ABUSING PRIVILEGES RESULTS IN CLOSING OF ALL SHORT CUTS

Public Took Switch Lamps and Other Railway Equipment.

ST. THOMAS, Aug. 30.—The L. and P. S. special officers have been directed to close the property of the railway to pedestrians and prosecute all trespassers on the right-of-way between London and Port Stanley. The short cuts over the bridges, except to employees, have been prohibited.

The permission hitherto given the people to pass and repass over the railway property has been abused, and the switch lamps and other equipment of the road interfered with by people wandering on the tracks.

Honorably Discharged.

Charged with changing the markers on a car at his garage in Aylmer, James Thayer of that town was discharged today by the county magistrate. Mr. Thayer was prosecuted by the provincial inspector. The evidence showed that Mr. Thayer was innocent of any illegal act, and that the auto in question had been driven by a person other than Thayer three days before the date on which Mr. Thayer was alleged to have committed the offence.

INGERSOLL, Aug. 30.—Joseph W. Horseman, who had resided here last night, was a native of East Nisouri, and until he came here to live retired more than a year ago was a progressive and widely-known farmer in the township of Thamesford. He was a son of the late Dennis Horseman. His mother, who is 95 years of age, resides in Toronto. Mr. Horseman was taken ill in January last, and for several months had been confined to his bed. Recently his condition had been such that his health was not unexpected. He was a member of the Methodist Church at Thamesford and of the official board. Besides his mother he is survived by his wife, one son, Dennis, at home, and four brothers, Henry and Andrew J. Toronto, John D. Ingersoll, and Edward R. Vancouver.

50,000 YOUNGSTERS SANG AT EXHIBITION

TORONTO, Aug. 30.—Young Ontario took possession of the Canadian National Exhibition grounds today at the invitation of the directors, who charged free entry for all youngsters. The result was the biggest crowd of children that has ever assembled, perhaps in any place in Canada. 230,000 admissions were reported for the day, and the number of boys and girls from the country visiting the big city for the first time wandered in amazement through the buildings, over the grounds and crowded into the grandstand, which was reserved for the exclusive use of the children in the afternoon. A wonderful spectacle was the community singing around the main bandstand when the voices of 50,000 young Canadians rendered national songs with stirring effect. They were led by 1,500 picked singers from the Toronto schools. Seven hundred tons were reported lost during the day, and in rounding up the wanderers the "lost children's tent" staff had a busy time.

SOWING FERTILIZER ON FALL WHEAT

JAIL GOVERNOR HAS MORE ROOM NOW

Dozen Prisoners Taken To Other Places of Incarceration.

ST. THOMAS, Aug. 30.—A general jail delivery was featured at the county jail yesterday afternoon. The sign of "standing room only" has been removed. Governor Luton has again a few furnished choice reservations left that he would let to responsible parties. Out of the nineteen inmates living on the fat of Elgin for the past month, only half a dozen of the county guests remain.

Bailiff Burns removed four of the prisoners to Barrow-Donald Snell, convicted of the theft of a crock of whiskey from a Yarmouth Heights resident; John Barrie, for an infraction of the O. T. A., committed twelve months ago, but had less than a year to go; Thomas Kennedy, a resident of the Rainy River district, sent down on a charge of vagrancy—and Mrs. Audrey Proctor was taken to the Mercer by a provincial lady officer. The remainder of the offenders had completed short terms in the local jail.

Appeal Judgment.

Found guilty of speeding her auto, according to the stopwatch of the motorcycle officer, Mrs. Orchard of Shelden was fined \$10 and costs today by the county magistrate. Mrs. Orchard emphatically denied the statement of the officer, who swore she was driving at the rate of 35 miles an hour. Her speedometer showed the figures to be 23 miles, and as her car was an expensive one she did not doubt the veracity of the machine. In this testimony Mrs. Orchard was corroborated by her son, who was with her. Mrs. Orchard will appeal, her husband giving notice of such intention to the magistrate.

Smith, in his couple of visits to Genrich's, when he stole the trousers, was accompanied by a girl of 18 years. Smith pleaded guilty this afternoon, and was remanded for a week. The girl, on assuring the magistrate that she had no part in the theft, was allowed to go. The goods were found in a tent outside the house where Smith was boarding. The accused has a wife under treatment at the Amasa Wood Hospital.

COLLECTOR RECEIVES CONSCIENCE MONEY

WINDSOR, Aug. 30.—The mysterious power of conscience has again been revealed in a letter received by A. T. Montreuil, collector of customs. Inclosed with it was 35 cents to pay for duty on a pair of baby's shoes which the writer had smuggled. Beyond the fact that the letter was posted in Walkerville, there is no clue to the identity of the writer.

The letter reads: "Dear Sir, Please find duty on a pair of baby's shoes, which I failed to pay (35 cents). At the time I did not know it was wrong, but now I realize it is the wrong thing to do. Thank God for light."

FINED \$100 FOR THEFT OF AUTO

Youth Accused by Chum Tells Court the Real Facts.
