VARSLY LIBRARY WILL BE ENLARGED TO 150,000 BOOKS

Will House Important Publications of Smithsonian Institute and U.S. National Museum.

ENLARGE AT ONCE

The public library act is clear and distinct, city officials stated today—the members of the public library board may ask for and receive 60 cents per book of population. They shall base their estimates upon the official population as submitted at the city hall.

It has been pointed out that the library board is spending a greater sum than set by the city council, but the library authorities state they are not expending more than the figure allowed by law.

According to the population figures available at the first of the year, the library authorities were entitled to more than \$30,000 roughly. They did not ask the city council for this amount, and in fact, have never asked in past years for all they could demand.

In 1922 a special call for economy issued from the city council, and the library board asked for \$200 more than in 1921. Early this year Mayor Wenige assured that they would be allowed as much as in 1921, but a new branch library was opened and the board officials stated that it would be impossible to get along without an increase. In certain years past the board has not been within \$4,000 of the amount set by law.

Mayor Wenige has warned the members of the public library board that if they exceed their appropriation, as fixed by the council, a new board will be imperative in January. But the board points out today that the city council will be empowered next year to appoint but one member.

The board consists of nine members, three appointed by the council, three by the board of education, two by the separate school board, and the mayor.

The city council and board of education representatives are appointed for three-year terms, one retiring at the end of each year. The separate school delegates are appointed for two years, one retiring at the end of each year. In this manner the council has the appointment of one member out of nine next year.
