

SAYS ACT UNEXCELLED IN ADMINISTRATION

London Mothers' Allowance
Investigation Tells of To-
ronto Conference.

"After two years of experiment, mothers' allowances evidently are realizing all that had been hoped for them."

Mrs. R. M. Graham, mothers' allowance investigator for London district, who has returned home from Toronto after attending a conference of investigators from all over the province, made the foregoing statement enthusiastically to The Advertiser yesterday.

"For one thing," she said, "the mothers' allowance act has the reputation of being one of the best administered ever put on the statute books of Ontario. It has been a number of people in Toronto. I hear it wherever I go. The other 17 investigators have had the same experience."

"The commission has worked slowly and surely, and from the beginning established a reputation for justice, fair dealing and sympathetic consideration of human values."

"Never did a commission have such loyal support as is given by the investigators. We have absolute confidence in Rev. Peter Bryce and the other members of the commission. We would do anything in our power to carry out their ideas."

"In addition, the work has gripped the heart and imagination of each one of us. It is such a human work, a work on which so much depends in the way of welfare of little children and the opportunity they are to enjoy to grow up robust, well-developed citizens, physically, mentally and morally."

"So many are the pitiful cases, the urgent cases that come to our notice, that the supremely important thing for each of us is to get families that are eligible comfortably established as quickly as possible."

A feature of the conference in which all the other investigators were keenly interested, as well as the commission, was the story told by the representative in the fire-swept north area.

"She was at 'Hallebury,'" stated Mrs. Graham, "the bravest woman you could imagine. Her own life and that of many others was saved by digging a trench near the lake. In this they huddled, wetting blankets from time to time to cover them entirely; otherwise they would have been suffocated by the smoke. Just at the hour in the night when all hope was abandoned the wind changed, as if by a miracle, sweeping the flames away from the town."

"Immediately after this terrifying experience the investigator assisted a doctor in the ushering into the world of a wee baby and caring for the mother. The only light they had was a flashlight. The remarkable part was that neither mother nor babe suffered seriously as a result of the conditions. You see, an investigator has to be prepared to lend a helping hand in any emergency, particularly if her territory is in a district like New Ontario."

"Many of the widows and children on the list of beneficiaries lost their all in the fire, and the first duty of the investigator after was to get Toronto to report and to get immediate relief for them."
