

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

The Delegates Meet and Dispose of Routine Business, Adjourning Without Nominations.

A McKinley Boom in Prospect—He May Yet Secure the Vote.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 8.—Among the distinguished guests at the convention were Geo. W. Childs and party, returning from their trip to the coast. California's lone banner of yesterday, was supplemented by a handsome blue standard borne by the Illinois delegation and planted in the main aisle, bearing the inscription, "Illinois—Lincoln, Grant, Logan," eloquently suggestive that if the convention chose to add a fourth name to that illustrious trio, "Barkis was willing."

Three minutes before the hour of opening proceedings (11 a.m.), Gov. McKinley, chairman elect, walked down the aisle to the accompaniment of cheers. He bore no roll of manuscript, and evidently he had prepared no speech. Temporary Chairman Bassett was late putting in an appearance, and so, in fact, were many delegates who were engaged in committee work a good part of the night, but the band kept things lively. Fred Douglas was invited to a seat on the platform.

At 11:45 o'clock the convention was called to order by Chairman Bassett. It was opened by prayer by Bishop Whipple. The committee on credentials asked permission to sit continuously until their labors were completed. The request was granted.

Hon. Wm. McKinley was named and appointed permanent chairman and was vigorously cheered. The whole proceedings were confined to committee work and reports, and the convention adjourned at 12:30 until 11 o'clock to-morrow.

W. C. Brown, of Rochester, in Foster district, who is a member of the United States Press: "I have heard nothing of the receipt of a telegram from Senator Sherman, but the delegates from Ohio need no notice from my quarter in behalf of McKinley. Whether Blaine men or Harrison men, they are first of all McKinley men, and would certainly present his name to the convention before the first ballot if he would permit it; but he said yesterday that those who were sincerely his friends could show it in no better way than by voting for him on the first ballot, and he would not permit the use of his name. He did not say anything about what we ought to do after the first ballot."

Payne, of Wisconsin, says this is the pull of the delegates: Harrison, 438; Blaine, 420; Almy, 42.

New York, June 8.—The World, this morning, has a Minneapolis special from Thos. S. Platt, as follows: "I am more confident of his nomination to-night than I have been at any time since Blaine's nomination is certain as anything can be that is in the future. The shaky condition of the administration forces is shown in their efforts to bring out compromise candidates. None of our friends thinks of suggesting a compromise candidate. We are absolutely sure, and know that we will win. In fact the battle is already won."

The World's Washington special says: Father Ducey has made another visit to Washington, arriving at mid-night last night, and returning home early this morning. He was at the hotel all the morning, and thereupon there is that he met a representative of Mr. Blaine and delivered over the letters that Mr. Blaine had been so anxious to have returned to him. Father Ducey would not discuss the matter in any form. The particulars of the story in circulation about Father Ducey's visit, is that \$365,000 was paid for the return of the package of letters. R. C. Kerens, of St. Louis, is said to have subscribed \$15,000, and five other men \$10,000 each. To whom this money is gone is left to conjecture.

CANADIAN.

Seizure of Smuggled Rum—The Morrisette Forfeiture—Suspension of Public Officials.

QUEBEC, June 8.—Enoch Lepage, accountant, and Woods, the assistant accountant in the Crown Lands Department, have been temporarily suspended pending an investigation into the Morrisette forgeries.

In the House, last night, Hon. Mr. Flynn introduced the Government Crown Lands legislation, restoring a system in vogue prior to the Macdonald regime and abolishing the forestry reserves.

MONTREAL, June 8.—President Van Horne has returned from his inspection trip and reports the route in better condition than ever since the rails were laid. Regarding the C.P.R. projects, Mr. Van Horne stated that the fast line of Atlantic steamers will be instituted before the new trans-Pacific line to Australia is completed. As to the road itself no changes were under consideration, except those set forth in the recent annual report.

After breakfast, they admired the scenery of Stanley Park for several hours, when they were entertained by the visiting party to lunch, after which the reverend tourists were royally welcomed by the congregation and given a hearty send-off on their way East, by the 2:30 C.P.R. Express.

AMERICAN NEWS.

Down on Blaine.

DETROIT, June 8.—W. J. P. Traynor, supreme grand master of the Orangemen of the United States, has sent the following to Grand Master Gamble at Minneapolis: "You are authorized to state for me to the delegates of the national convention that Thomas W. Palmer, of Michigan, or any other equally good American on either ticket, will receive 1,250,000 votes, none of which will ever be cast for Blaine." Traynor says the reason for this is Blaine's partiality to the Catholics in making appointments and because he attended high mass at the capitol over the body of Senator Barbour.

Chinese at the Antipodes.

BRISBANE, Queensland, June 8.—A large proportion of the Chinese population of South Australia is migrating to the other colonies, and many are coming to the Queensland border with a view of settling there. The Government has directed the border police to be reinforced, and the Chinese influx prevention act will be strictly carried out.

Demands of Woman Suffrage.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 7.—The Federal Suffrage Association of the United States has presented a long set of resolutions to the National Republican convention, asking the adoption of a plank in the platform extending the right of suffrage to all citizens regardless of sex. The resolutions recite that foreigners, the poorhouse, the jail, the asylum and ignorance have been enfranchised, while the school and church are disfranchised. They call attention to the last Republican platform, affirming the "supreme and sovereign right of every citizen to cast his ballot, and ask that 'citizen' be defined so as to include both sexes.

New Line of Clippers.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 8.—Another clipper line has been established between New York and this city, by Balfour, Guthrie & Co. It is learned that Balfour, Guthrie & Co., have been considering the subject for some time, and had been looking for suitable vessels. It is reported that they have chartered the ship Annie Johnson, which is now on her way from Hamburg to New York. Arriving at the latter place, she will load for Portland, Tacoma and this city. What other vessels the firm will secure is not yet known, but it is believed that the line is to be permanent. Balfour, Guthrie & Co., have really made no definite plans as to the number of vessels they will place on the run, but they intend to remain as long as competitors with the Desmond & Co., Grace & Co., and others.

He Ate Bunch Grass.

SEATTLE, June 8.—A Vancouver special says: Mayor Cope to-day received a letter from a man signing "A. Hughes, a native of Prince Edward Island." He says that he was working in a camp on the Great Northern; that he prevented an American from hitting another Canadian, and that he then had a fight with rough, who called him a North American Canadian. He was driven from one camp to another through Eastern Washington, branded as a murderer, and several times had to flee for his life and hide. At one time he had to subsist for two days on bunch grass. He finally reached here penniless and exhausted.

Trading Rivals Dispute.

SEATTLE, June 8.—A small right-of-way conflict occurred on the water front yesterday morning between the Puget Sound and Alaska Steamship Company and the Seattle and Montana Railway Company, but no blows were struck and injunction proceedings removed the controversy to court. Under its franchise from the city the Puget Sound and Alaska Company began driving piles for a spur track from the Lake Shore tracks to the Yeeler wharf, to be used for hauling Gilman coal to the end of the wharf for use on the steamers. As this track would cross the whole right-of-way, on which two tracks have already been built, at a sharp angle, the Great Northern objected to its construction. It sent a gang of men to stop the work. As fast as the Puget Sound & Alaska men moved a pile or timber, the Great Northern men pulled it away from them, so that it was impossible to get any work done. Meanwhile application was made to Judge Lichtenberg in the Superior court for an injunction to restrain the Puget Sound & Alaska Company from constructing the track, for the reasons stated. A restraining order was granted, and June 11, will be the day for hearing an application for a writ to set aside the restraining order. The Puget Sound & Alaska company had sent an agent to all attempts to continue the work.

Crandall, the Insurance Swindler.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 8.—Crandall has confessed. Realizing the futility of further attempts to deny his identity, in face of the weight of evidence which has been so completely established, he has admitted his guilt by his counsel this morning and said: "There is no use of concealing my identity any longer. I am Crandall, Brant B. Crandall." The statement was made public by the lawyer. Crandall is the man who is accused of attempting to swindle insurance companies. His death was reported, but he was found alive in California under another name.

CABLE NEWS.

Enin Paasha Believed to be Dead—The Miners' Congress Favors Eight Hours.

YVESVINS AGAIN IN ERUPTION—DEATHS IN THE BOHEMIAN MINES—AN ARMENIAN UPRISING.

LONDON, June 8.—The police have in custody a man charged with the murder of two girls, Alice March and Emma Shirvell, and will arraign the prisoner in court, on Friday. It is stated that evidence will be presented to show that this is not the first crime of the kind that the accused has committed, and that the public will be surprised when they hear the evidence.

Enin Paasha's Death Almost Certain.

BERLIN, June 8.—A despatch from Zanzibar to the Tagblatt says that English reports, received by way of Mombasa, confirm the report from Arab sources, received a month ago, to the effect that Enin Paasha was dead. The general opinion in Berlin is that the report must now be accepted as true, and deep regret is expressed in Colonial circles for the intrepid explorer.

Eruption of Vesuvius.

NAPLES, June 7.—The eruption of Mount Vesuvius is increasing and large quantities of lava are flowing down the mountain. An earthquake was felt at San Severo. The motion was undulatory. There was no damage.

Miners' Congress.

LONDON, June 8.—The International Congress of Miners, to-day, took up the subject of an eight hour day for miners throughout the world. The Belgian delegation moved, and the German delegates seconded the adoption of the eight hour principle, to be enforced, if need be, by a universal strike. A discussion followed and is still in progress, the English delegates being divided on the subject. No decision has been reached as yet.

Over Three Hundred Lives Lost.

VIENNA, June 7.—According to the official report on the Birkenberg mine disaster near Prizram, there were 807 men at work in the mine at the time of the disaster, of whom only 475 were rescued. The bodies of 304 of the 332 men who lost their lives have been recovered, leaving only 28 bodies missing. Two hundred and ninety-two women were left widows by the fire, and 692 children under 14 years of age were made orphans.

Armenian Uprising.

VIENNA, June 7.—There is an uprising of Armenians in the district of Moush Season. Turkish troops sent out to quell the disturbance have been defeated. The telegraphic wires have been cut and no further details are obtainable.

Fearful Fire on Shipboard.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 6.—A frightful disaster is reported from Central Russia. The steamer Albion, while plying in the Onega river, a tributary of the Volga, took fire and sixty persons were drowned in endeavoring to escape from the burning vessel. Thirty persons were rescued, and the remainder were killed. The calamity occurred not far from Kartsensk.

"THE ORIENTALS" SUSPENSION.

Causes of the Failure—Statement by the Directors—The Bank Never Strong.

LONDON, June 8.—The announcement of the suspension of the Oriental Bank, has caused a great sensation in financial circles, and especially among traders and brokers interested in the East. The Bank has never managed to get a quotation, and there have for some time been apprehensions as to its security. The liabilities are very large and will amount to several millions of pounds. The value of the assets is not ascertained, but a statement is expected. This evening the Board of Directors issued a notice stating that the Board, this afternoon, found it necessary to suspend the business of the bank, and to request the creditors to meet at once for the purpose of discussing the situation. The bank was founded in 1832, and had a long and successful career. It was one of the first banks to do business in the East, and had a large and profitable trade with China, Japan, the Straits and Australia, and the recent disastrous hurricane in the Malay Archipelago had been taken to protect the assets of the corporation.

BOHEMIA'S MINI.

Important Statement With Respect to the Cause.

VIENNA, June 8.—The Austrian Congress of the Social Democracy makes a public statement on the subject of the silver mine calamity near Prizram, Bohemia. It is claimed in this report that, when the miners, after the fire broke out, started to get out of the mine, the officials drove them back, saying there was no danger, and that this was the cause of the great loss of life. Another incident showing, it is claimed, negligence on the part of the mine officials is that the key of the house containing the fire engines belonging to the mine could not be found until after the fire had broken out. It is urged that the guilty officials be held to legal responsibility. Investigation regarding the cause of the fire indicates that it was started by the lighted tapers of a small wooden altar erected to the patron saint of Bohemia by some of the miners in one of the galleries of the mine.

ULSTER SPEAKS.

Declaration That the Results of Home Rule Would Be Most Calamitous.

BELFAST, June 8.—A statement giving the views of the Protestants of Ulster on Home Rule, and signed by the chief officers of the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Congregational churches in Ireland and by 6,044 ministers, elders, etc., has been posted to every Protestant minister in the United Kingdom. The statement argues that Irish Home Rule would inevitably bring about an attempt by the Roman Catholics to oppress the Protestants of Ireland, and that the latter would never submit to such oppression, and

the result would be most calamitous. The Protestants of Ireland are, therefore, appealed to stand by their brethren in Ireland.

THE MINNEAPOLIS CONVENTION.

Adjournment of the Committee Without Transacting Business of Importance.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 8.—The National Committee, at its meeting this afternoon, without taking action on the temporary chairmanship, adjourned until 9 p. m. The Harrison managers officially announced that the President will receive 550 votes, while the Blaine leaders maintain with lofty confidence that their candidate will receive three-fifths of the votes of the convention, and that he will be nominated by acclamation. A table that found considerable circulation in the hotel lobbies last night gives Blaine 404 and Harrison 468 votes.
