Cleveland, Ohio, Oct. 10.—The Carnegie Steel Co, has taken the first step towards the building up of all-water transportation of export steel and iron from Lake Erie ports to Europe, in chartering four vessels to load with steel at Conneaut, Ohio, and steam through via the Welland canal and the St. Lawrence to Liverpool. Their capacity is about 2,500 tons each, with draught of 18 feet of water. It is the intention to load each vessel with 1,000 tons of steel at Conneaut and fill out at Montreal with 1,500 tons of wood pulp.
