LIQUOR REPORT
HOUSES ABOLISHED
An order of the Canada Gazette has been issued publishing an order-in-council under date of October 8th, in which the keeping of intoxicating liquor in the Province of New Brunswick for export and the transportation of intoxicating liquor therefrom by persons other than brewers and distillers only licensed by the Government of Canada, is forbidden on and after November 30th, 1923.

This action the proclamation sets forth, was taken as the result of an order-in-council of the province of New Brunswick passed on September 12th last.

OLYMPIA UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT

HOW GOVERNMENT CONTROL WORKS

The Westminster Presbytery (which includes over fifty Presbyterian congregations, situated in the cities of Vancouver, New Westminster, North and South Vancouver, Prince Rupert, Chilliwack, and the Lower Mainland), at a largely attended regular meeting held in Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church, Vancouver, on September 24th, 1923, unanimously passed the following resolution:

Whereas the amount of liquor being sold in the sixty-eight Government liquor stores in British Columbia, is constantly increasing, the amount sold from October 1st, 1922, to April 1st, 1923, being an increase of over twenty-one per cent. above the amount sold for the corresponding six months in the preceding year;

Whereas the authority of the Department of Customs, at Ottawa, the British Columbia Government Liquor Control Board, from January 1st, 1923, to June 30th, 1923, did not import one-half the liquor brought into British Columbia, the figures given in the Senate at Ottawa, on June 27th, being: British Columbia Government Liquor Control Board, 100,881 gallons, and 124,066 gallons by the private export houses;

Whereas it was stated in the Senate on the authority of Attorney-General A. M. Manson, that these export houses "sell largely to a string of smaller illicit dealers";

Whereas at Prince Rupert on August 24th, 1923, at the British Columbia Municipalities Convention, it was moved by Reeve Louie, of North Vancouver, seconded by Reeve Chambers, of Port Moody, and unanimously agreed that this convention place itself on record as strongly protesting against the present disgraceful situation throughout the province in regard to the formation of clubs, and the sale of liquor therein; that the present situation is worse than in the days of the open bar, and is not only destructive to the morals of the people, but is resulting in bringing about general contempt for law and order; that the Government be urged at the earliest possible moment to consider this situation and enact laws to alter this deplorable state of affairs;

Whereas the effect of the more than two years' Government sale of liquor has been a serious contributing cause to the depression of all lines of legitimate business;

Whereas it is the belief of the members of this Court that not only has drunkenness increased throughout the province, but also, that bootlegging is now everywhere more prevalent than ever before, with a result that gambling and immorality have become a scandal and a disgrace in many places;

Whereas Vancouver city has licensed 105 clubs commonly known as "beer clubs," one-half of these being located in hotels;

Whereas the Vancouver press has repeatedly claimed that there are more unlicensed than licensed places;

Now, therefore, this Presbytery of Westminster, affirms emphatically that the claims made in 1920 that Government sale of liquor would reduce bootlegging, decrease taxation, and result in an increased respect for law and order have been proved by actual experience to be utterly false in every particular.

The Presbytery, alarmed by the spread of lawlessness and immorality, and in view of the fact that the Government of British Columbia, and its effect, not only on morals, but also on the legitimate constructive business enterprises of this province.

And Presbytery requests the Government and Legislature of the Province, in the interests of morality and good government to take adequate steps forthwith to rectify the present deplorable and dangerous situation.

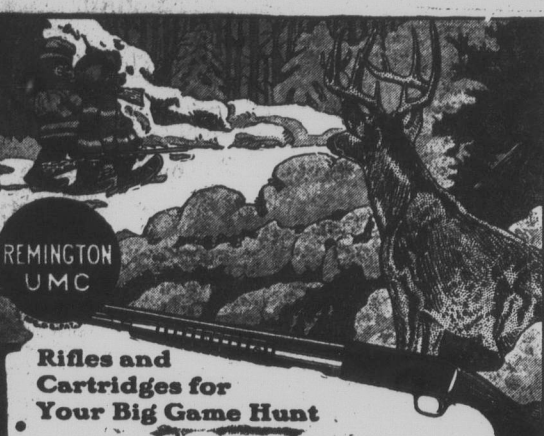

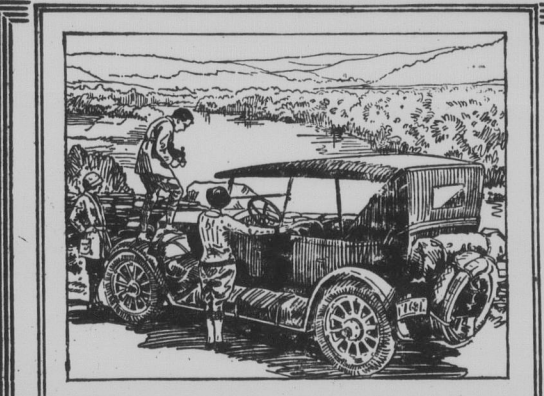

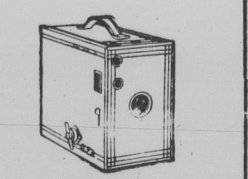
