SMOKE THE OAKLE AND PADRE CIGARS! THE VERY BEST OF LONDON. Accurate receives daily from London. A vessel left this morning to take aboard the garnison at Alexandria. The vessel is a large one, and is well equipped. It is expected that the officers have had much reason for some time to suspect that several of the men were defrauding the Customs of the fifty cents per barrel in American flour, which has been charged under the tariff. Careful watch having been kept, it was learned that in many quarters flour had been entered for warehouse, but was allowed to go into consumption, afterwards to be replaced by Canadian flour, which was exported, and the warehouse bond thus cancelled. Last night the officers mentioned seized 1,400 barrels of flour belonging to Major G. Munro, and detained several other consignments which are to be seized. The seized goods amount to some ten thousand dollars in value.

THE TROUBLES IN EGYPT. THE ENGLISH DRAWING CLOSE UPON THE ARAB'S PREPOSTEROUS TERMS FOR PEACE. ALEXANDRIA, July 26.—Last evening a decided attempt was made to surprise the British outpost. Six hundred men approached the British line when the 38th regiment opened fire. The enemy retreated precipitately. During the remainder of the night the Egyptians continued moving about just beyond range. Reports that Arabi was attempting to treat for surrender were probably circulated to lull the vigilance of the British. The rifles and native police to-day surrounded the village of Carnarus beyond Pompey's pillar where there is a regular market for loot. A few cart loads were seized. A force from English headquarters was ordered to push forward a view to prove that Bedouin and the khedive's servants really did looting at Ramleh. Arabi is gradually withdrawing his troops and retreating to Kafr-Dwar. It is rumored that he is disposed to NEGOTIATE WITH THE BRITISH for the surrender of his forces if the khedive can be prevailed upon to guarantee him immunity and withdraw the decree dismissing him from the ministry. The khedive refuses to entertain the proposition to extend the amnesty to the principal rebel officers, but is inclined to agree to a general amnesty on condition that the rebels should be obliged to abandon allegiance to Arabi. LONDON, July 26.—The Times says that neither a sovereign, sultan nor under any other title will there be room for the influence of the sultan in Egypt after the possibility of sovereignty have been officially thrown aside in the hour of trial. THE SULTAN MAY HAVE AMUSED himself by forming new alliances and complimenting new allies with decorations and medals, but it is not to be expected that sympathies will give the port. England by acting alone will acquire and assert her right of controlling in future the country she saves. We must plainly show the sultan and the powers that we intend to work thoroughly and to the end. When that is done the sultan and his colleagues must yield to the compulsion of events. THE FALL MAIL GAZETTE says there is no prospect of a return to the normal conditions of the Egyptian expedition upon the finances of India, except temporarily. If the government is weak enough to yield to the temptation of the sultan, all its members cannot be expected to SWALLOW THEIR WORDS and believe the white spirit of their previous utterances about a legitimate application of Indian laws. IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS an address thanking the queen for calling on the rebels in the Sudan was read. The address was adopted by a large majority.
