The Bitter Feeling of One for the Other

Rapidly Growing. LONDON, May 8.-Matters on the continen continue to wear a very uncomfortable aspect. The Germans are mightily indignant at the

behavior of the Paris mob during last week and treat the insults howled along the boule vards, especially the cries of "Give us back our clocks," referring to the timepieces alleg-ed to have been looted by Prussian officers from French country houses during the war, with altogether unnecessary importance. The Reichstag has during the past two days voted

Reichstag has during the past two days voted large additional military supplies with hardly any opposition, and immense bodies of troops continue to be massed on the frontier, and expulsions of everyone suspected of French sympathies in Alsace-Lorraine proceed with-undiminished vigor.

In France popular feeling is growing stronger, and it is confidently expected at Paris that the present Go-blet Cabinet will be overturned in order to make room for one more energetic and less disposed to bow down before Germany. The Ministers, with the exception of Boulanger, are designated as cowards by a majority of Frenchmen, who are indignant at their thoroughly apparent dread of offending Prince Bismarck.

Meanwhile, although Schnaebeles is back in France, his trial is proceeding at Leipzig, with the object of proving the complicity of the French Government in the recent troubles in Alsace-Lorraine and in anti-German intrigues among the annexed populations. It
