McFarlane, an employe at the works. Shearin was arrested for this and asked the officer to take him to the heuse that he might wash up before going to the lock-up. The request was granted, to the lock-up. The request was granted, when he managed to elude the officer and for a time his whereabouts were not known. In 1880 he brought some stolen cattle to Toronto and sold them, for which he was afterwards arrested and sent to the Central Prizer.
