JANUARY.—British Parliament was opened by the Queen in person, on the 21st. The final classification of members gave the Liberals 335, the Conservatives 240 and the Home Rulers 80.

FEBRUARY.—London was under martial law for one whole day on the 5th inst. and a great deal of damage was done. The city of Boston suffered severely from floods and the loss of property estimated at one million dollars.

MARCH.—This month was ushered in with very heavy storms. The Nova Scotia Legislature opened its session on the 2nd inst. Active measures were taken by our Government to enforce the provisions of the old treaty of 1818 in regard to the fisheries.
