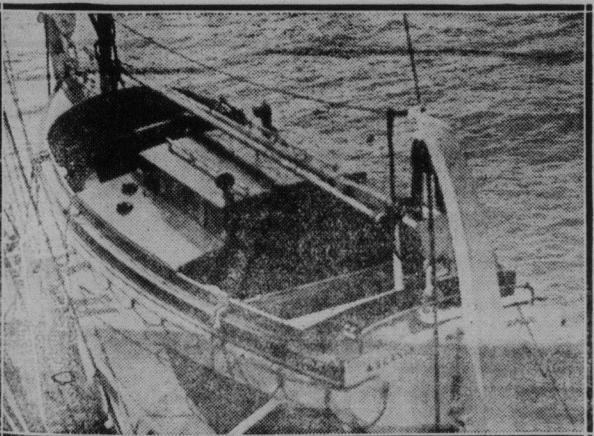

AMERICAN SHIPS OPERATED AT LOSS

The Deficit on the Leviathan for Year Was Million Dollars.

Washington.—The United States steamship Leviathan was operated at a loss of about \$1,000,000 for the first year it was in commission and its deficit for the current fiscal year which will end June 30th next will not exceed that sum, according to a statement made by Admiral Palmer, President of the Emergency Fleet Corporation. The United States Line as a whole, which include, in addition to the Leviathan, the steamships George Washington, President Harding, President Roosevelt, the Republic and the American, reported a loss for the year beginning July 1st, 1923, and ending June 30th, 1924, of a little more than \$3,000,000.

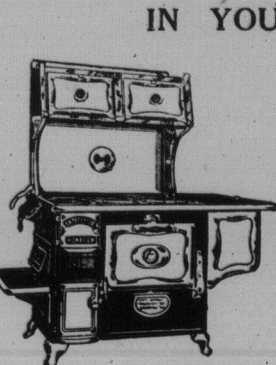
