LADIES' SEMINARY—BOARD AND EDUCATION.

MISS FRASER, (LATE OF QUEBEC)

Assisted by Miss ANDERSON, who has just returned from Germany.

**WILL** be prepared, on the 11th September next, to receive a limited number of Young Ladies for whom a superior education is desired. Her course of instruction will embrace the following branches: English Language and Literature; Composition; Geography and History; Arithmetic; Penmanship; Drawing; French and German; Music, Instrumental and Vocal; and the various branches of Needlework. The services of the masters will be secured for the pupils in Drawing, and for the more advanced in Vocal and Instrumental Music.

While great care will be taken in forming the manners of the pupils, the intellectual standard of the school will be kept as high as the time and the attainments of the scholars will allow.

A leading object of this Seminary will be, to give to Evangelical Religion the place which rightly belongs to it in a complete system of education. Family worship will be daily maintained. The Holy Scriptures will be subject of regular study, and their teachings will be made the law of the house. At the same time, the denominational preferences of parents will be faithfully respected.

To those who may be committed to her care as Boarders, Miss F. will aim to supply all the comforts of a home, so far as this is compatible with the system and discipline of a school. The young ladies will be much in the society of their teachers, and such visits only will be paid and received by them as their parents and guardians may allow.

In addition to the staff of Teachers and Masters above mentioned, the following gentlemen, to whom others may be added, will deliver occasional Honorary Lectures on Religious Literary, and Scientific subjects:—Rev. Dr. Burns, of Knox's Church, Toronto; Professor Taylor, of the United Presbyterian Church; Mr. Orniston, of the Normal School; and Rev. Mr. Marling, of the Second Congregational Church.

The scholastic year will be divided into periods of eleven weeks, commencing with the second week of September and ending about the middle of July.

No deduction will be made on account of absence during any part of a quarter; and six months' notice will be expected to be given of the intention to remove a pupil.

These terms will include instruction in all the

branches, excepting those only where extra teachers may be required.

Each boarder will be required to bring with her, bed in folding, towels, knife, fork, and spoon. Washing extra.

The classes will be opened (God willing) on Monday, September 10th, at 10 o'clock A. M.

The house taken by Miss Fraser is that neat new erection at the head of Alfred Street (formerly Temperance Street), west side of Bay Street.
