The Anatomy of the Brain. A text-book for medical students, by Richard H. Whitehead, M.D., Professor of Anatomy in the University of N. Carolina. Illustrated with 4r engravings; 96 pages. Cloth, \$1.00. Publishers, The F. A. Davis Co., Philadelphia.

This work is suitable for students of Brain Anatomy, being clear, concise and untrammeled with those subjects which are still matters of controversy. The first chapter considers the embryology of the nervous system, thus explaining the origin of the five parts of the encephalon. The text is very brief in describing the various anatomal structures throughout, and does not supplement the bare anatomical facts by comparative descriptions or physiological functions so valuable in aiding the student to assimilate this difficult subject.

We are pleased to note that the Latin terms adopted by the German Anatomical Society have been inserted parenthetically

after the name commonly used in this country.

This is a volume of almost nine hundred pages, printed in easily-read type, and is fully up to date, embracing practically all, or nearly all, the terms relating to Bacteriology.
