tween the different provinces may be brought to and kept at the same level. I doubt if that is possible in any other way than by some system of federal cooperation or control. But the problem is more far-reaching than that. What I have said with regard to industries in the different provinces is equally true of industry as between different countries. The League of Nations has recognized that fact as fundamental, and the effort of the League of Nations to-day is directed towards bringing about similar standards in industry

among the different countries of the world. We, as a country, are pledged to further to the best of our ability the various obligations of the Labour conventions of the League of Nations, and I hold that this federal parliament has an obligation in this matter to seek to bring about a condition whereby in the first instance the standards in industry as between the different provinces will be at one and the same level.

At six o'clock the house adjourned without question put, pursuant to standing order.
