BUDGETARY CUT-BACKS

Ms. Lynn McDonald (Broadview-Greenwood): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Right Hon. Prime Minister. Why has his Government decided that our cultural agencies will suffer budgetary cutbacks that are twice as high as cuts made in other federal areas?

Right Hon. Brian Mulroney (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, all Government agencies will be subject to budgetary cutbacks, and as far as I know, a general attempt has been made to proceed equitably throughout the Government, perhaps with a few variations. Basically, however, our purpose has been to clean up our public finances, but in a manner that is fair to all. If the Hon. LEVEL OF GOVERNMENT FUNDING

Ms. Lynn McDonald (Broadview-Greenwood): Mr. Speaker, it is hard to see what is equitable about twice as strong budget cuts. Are they twice as less worthy as other agencies for government support?
