INTRODUCTORY REPORT

Before entering into the questions contained in the written trivactions, under which I acted, and before attempting to state an opinion properties existing situation of affairs in the Saskatchewan, I will bridge allude to the time occupied in travel, to the route followed, and to the general circumstances attending my journey.

Starting from Fort Garry on the 25th October, I reached Fort Ellice at junction of Qu'Appelle and Assimptoine Rivers on the 30th of the sar month. On the following day I continued my journey towards Carl which place was reached on the 9th November, a detention of two days having occurred upon the banks of the South Saskatcheway, ret, the waters of which were only partially frozen. After a delay of firm ays in Carlton. the North Branch of the Saskatchewan was reported it for the pasts horses, and on the morning of the 14th November I proceeded on my ourney towards Edmenton. By this time snow had falled to the d of about two inches over the country, which rendered in abandon the use of wheels for the transport of baggage, substituting a li sled in place of the cart which had hitherto been used, although I still tained the same mode of conveyance, namely the saddle, for Passing the Hudson Bay Company Posts of Battle River, Fort Pitt Victoria, I reached Edmonton on the night of the 26th November. Relast 200 miles the country had become clear of snow, and the free withstanding the high attitude of the region, had decreased in Starting again on the afternoon of the 1st December I recrossed katchewan River below Edmonton and continued in a South-W rection towards the Rocky Mountain House, passing through which even at that advanced period of the year, still retained of in summer beauty.
