Canadian Wins

BY THE CLYMERITESLittle Hollander and His Big
Bat Beat Durham—Leafs
Play Good Ball.

DURHAM, N.C., April 19.—Toronto kept up its hard hitting today, easily beating Durham, which had trimmed Richmond three straight. The game was never in question, but Little Hollander clinched it in the fifth with a slugging home run inside the grounds to centre. His hitting has been terrific in all the games played. In the same innings Jordan poled one a mile over right-field fence, six inches foul. The Toronto men hit all along the line, and with men on were the most dangerous. Twice they got three and twice two hits in an inning. The batting order was shifted. In the first five innings, against a right-hander, they scored five runs on seven hits, and off a southpaw in the last four scored three runs on three hits. In the field they played without a slip.

Herbert was in great shape, allowing only a hit to start the second and fifth, but no score even threatened. He got all the others in order without a hard chance. Even the two hits could have been nailed with luck.

Manning was rapped freely in his first innings, but in the other three got his men in order. He let out his kinks and looked a thousand per cent better than a week ago. He showed nice speed, as well as his slow ball and curve. On this day, he may be a valuable man to the team once he gets right. Three hits were made off him. Infielder Joe Pope was released to New York today. No place has been found for Prieste yet. He will go somewhere this week. Toronto plays Durham again the next two days.
