

FOUNTAIN FAY PAYS BIG PRICE IN STAKE

Robert Davies' Candidate Lands
Feature on Closing Day at Windsor.

WINDSOR, July 21.—The first summer meeting of the Windsor Jockey Club concluded today with the daily card of seven races, the feature of which was the \$1500 D. and C. Stakes, the fourth race, at one mile. Fountain Fay, owned by Robert Davies of Toronto, won, displaying startling improvement, in most decisive fashion.
