Amalgamation.

NE of the arguments made use of in advocating the Union of the Presbyterian Churches in Canada was that it would tend to amore economical and convenient distribution of the effective working power of the Church: that in many places where there were two weak, struggling, and rival congregations, the interests of religion would be better served by one minister and church organization. accompanying table shews that this expectation has not been disappointed, for here are at least thirty-seven cases in point, where congregational unions have been harmoniously effected by those who formerly belonged to different sections of the Church. In each of these, members formerly in connection with the Church of Scotland are now found worshipping along with their brethren who previous to the Union were identified with the Canada Presbyterian Church. And possibly there are other instances which have escaped our notice where like happy results have followed the Union.
