THE YOUNG BABY

There is no feeling quite so helpless as that which comes over a young mother when she realizes that she has complete care of her baby. And the reason why so many babies who were "perfect dears" with the nurse become "wailing fiends" when alone with mother is simply a matter of nerves. The little mother is tired out and worried and afraid of all kinds of nameless terrors. Suppose the babe should have a convulsion! Suppose he slipped from her shaking hands after his morning tub! What could you expect from poor baby? He is a mirror that reflects his mother's every mood. A quiet, self-contained, sensible mother should have under ordinary circumstances a good reasonable baby.

Baby is just a little animal and will behave as all other healthy little animals if he is left to himself. He does not need to be held in arms nor rocked in a cradle; he doesn't need a pacifier nor a meal every time he cries. He will cry, of course, and kick, and perhaps scream, but if he is well that is to be expected; he needs more exercise.

Here are just a few things to remember: From the very first day of baby's life be regular in everything you do for him. Give him his tub bath every day in water about 98 degrees Fahrenheit. Let him have all the fresh air possible, but never expose him to draughts. Let him have boiled water to drink between meals. Let him sleep by himself in his own basket or crib. Train him to go to sleep by himself without patting or rocking; he will never want what he knows nothing about. Weigh him once a week; if he gains steadily it is a sign of health. Above everything else, feed him regularly every two hours during the day, time until he is three months old. If he is asleep at feeding time, waken him until he becomes restless in his habits.

Home Hints.

Grate an apple into your horse-radish to make a fine relish. When grinding bread crumbs slip a quarter jar well over the grinder, and the crumbs will not fly all over the room.

In making sauces use clarified fat from the soup kettle in which to cook the flour, then beat in a few bits of butter to the finished sauce for the flavor.

Half a lemon placed in the water in which dish towels are soaked will sweeten them.

A cupful of boiled rice added to muffins, waffles or pancakes makes them lighter, more easily digested and more palatable.

House Cleaning Hints.

Curtains will hang straight if a small lead weight is sewn in each end of the lower hem.

If pantry shelves have no doors, put up a window shade on a spring roller to keep out dust.

A good medicine cabinet may be made out of a discarded croquet box. Rugs will not slip on a polished floor if a strip of rubber is sewn on the under side of each end.

If a small clock is beyond repair, keep it for the sick room; it will be found useful to indicate the time for taking medicine. As each dose is given the patient turn the hands to the hour when the next dose is due.

Start your housecleaning in the cupboards. When they are all thoroughly cleaned and everything in place in them, the rooms are not hard to do. Brass bedsteads can be kept bright by rubbing them occasionally with a cloth moistened with sweet oil. Afterwards polish with a dry cloth.

Save old tea leaves. After a few days pour boiling water over them; cool, strain and use the water for washing paint.

How to Climb Stairs.

Very few people get the benefit that is possible from this exercise. In walking upstairs the feet should be placed squarely on each step; heel and ball, and then the work should be performed slowly and deliberately. There is no strain on any particular muscle, each one working naturally. This is an excellent exercise for the lower limbs, and also for the heart and lungs if the chest is thrown well out. It is the habit of climbing stairs in a half-doubled position that causes weariness and backache.
