

Baseball Give Credit To McCaffery

SUCCESS SURE FOR NEW INTERNATIONAL

Provided We Get the Break. Declares McCaffery, Who is Still Working on the Job.

New York, April 2.—The new International League Professional Baseball Clubs, which sprang from the ruins of the old International, will probably be formally launched at a meeting of the club owners here on Thursday. Indications as to the moves in the scheme gathered for the conference foreshadowed the organization of an eight-club league sufficiently formidable to weather the conditions arising from the war.

The makeup of the new organization is still a point of conjecture. All manner of rumors have been heard as to the final alignment of the clubs. It even has been suggested that a six-club league would be formed. But it was well known that the new International would embrace eight clubs, and that they would be Toronto, Baltimore, Jersey City, Rochester, Buffalo, Newark, St. Paul and Newark, a circuit the teams could tour with a minimum of expense and time.

The prime movers in the undertaking were still undetermined as to when the organization would start its championship season. Some are said to favor a late start, about May 15, while others prefer to get under way on or about May 1 and to continue until the middle of August.

Little difficulty in procuring sufficient players to fill eight clubs is anticipated, despite the fact that all of the players of the defunct International League have been declared free agents by the National Commission, and many have been negotiating with major league clubs for positions. A large majority of them already are in line for jobs in the new circuit. It is likely that most of the players on clubs of New York State League also will be seen in the new International this season.

"The player question is not disturbing us in the least," declared Jack Dunn. "We do not expect any trouble whatever in getting enough players for all of the teams. The Baltimore Club would like to start the season tomorrow if need be, and I dare say a majority of the other teams would be able to get right into action. Since we have announced our decision to organize a new league I have obtained letters from many baseball men in all parts of the country congratulating us on our action. It is the general opinion that baseball will come back strong this season and that it would have been a serious mistake for us all to withdraw from the field."

Doubt, concerning whether the Jersey City Club would enter the new league has been dispelled with the statement of Dave Driscoll, who will hold the franchise in that city, to the effect that he already is entering a team and hopes to make a strong bid for the title. It is Driscoll's hope that the old rivalry that obtained between the Jersey City and Newark Clubs when both were members of the old International be rekindled.

The identity of the prospective Buffalo franchise owner still is unknown, but it is believed by the professional baseball circles. Buffalo is believed to be one of the richest territories in the entire circuit, provided a good club is placed there.

Action probably will be taken at the conference on Thursday to pay all debts of the International League and to pay the salaries due the players of the Buffalo Club, amounting to approximately \$2200, and whatever money is left after all the league debts are paid will probably be divided among the Montreal, Providence and Richmond Clubs.

Every precaution will be taken by the new organization to guard against extravagance. The business of the league will be conducted with every effort to officials, at least for the duration of the war. The salary of the president, John H. Farrell, will probably be determined at the conference.

The league also will decide on a salary limit and take steps to cut down traveling expenses to rock-bottom.

One of the most enthusiastic supporters of the new league is James J. McCaffery, president of the Toronto Club, which for several years has been one of the best. Mr. McCaffery has remained in this city for a few weeks attending to business in connection with the formation of the league, and is highly optimistic over its chances of success.

TWO STATE LEAGUE CITIES TO BE ADDED

Toronto, Syracuse, Scranton, Rochester, Buffalo, Newark, Jersey City, Baltimore.

The new International League will fix all the details for the season at the meeting to be held in New York today.

It should be even a better circuit than that of the last few years. The "chop" or dead towns have been dropped over the side and a live organization with magnets of the right kind at the head of it is sure to keep the game moving in the proper direction.

Richmond and Montreal, two cities that were a drag in former years, will not be in the reorganized circuit. Many fans are still puzzling about the make-up of the league. Some think six and others are sure that eight clubs will comprise the league. The latter are right. Newark has been interviewed by the press within the last few days. Newark is a good ball town and for a neighbor it will have Jersey City, an International League city for many long years. Toronto, of course, will again be the leading town in the league.

The Pacific Coast League baseball season opened yesterday with local playing weather in all three California cities, where the six teams met for initial games. San Francisco opened on the home grounds with Oakland; Salt Lake City played at Los Angeles; and Vernon at Sacramento. The Portland club withdrew from the league some months ago and its place has been taken by Sacramento.

This totals six, and just leaves two more to round out the circuit.

Syracuse, N. Y., and Scranton, Pa., are the best cities of the old New York State League. They will be added to the International and should be able to draw much better than either Montreal or Richmond. This makes a compact league and many dollars will be saved by cutting out the long jump to Richmond.

It is expected that these cities will be announced as the new holding franchises in the International, or any other name the directors think fit to call it at today's meeting.

The schedule will call for the league to open on May 1 and to close early in September. Plenty of players are available and a real A.A. league will be the outcome.

A despatch from Kansas City says: "Joe Schmitt, infielder, and Mickey Lange, catcher, free agents released by Toronto when the International League collapsed, have been signed by John Gansel for the Kansas City Blues. If this statement is correct the Toronto team has lost two good players, men who will be hard to replace. Schmitt played both the infield and the outfield for Toronto last year, and was more successful in the outfield garden. His hitting was very opportunistic, and his long-distance drives were an iron mark to the pennant. Lange worked most of the games for the Leafs without complaint or relief. His heart was always in his work, and he was greatly admired by the fans."

The loss of Lange and Schmitt is a blow to the local club, but they will be hard to replace in replacing these men.
