

## DEVELOP OIL LANDS IN PEACE RIVER

New Organization Will Lead  
in Work of Opening Up  
of New Country.

Leading men in Toronto commercial life are joining in the search for the millions that expert geologists believe lie in the oil sands of the Peace River district.

A company has been formed that has as president, John Hallam, the well-known hider and fur merchant, and as a vice-president, Allan McPherson, prominent in lumbering and industrial circles. Thomas A. Mitchell of Denton, Mitchell and Duncan, is treasurer, and Adam Anderson, manufacturer agent, is secretary. Other directors are Thomas A. Mitchell, Wm. Bradshaw, of Bradshaw and Sons; Sydney C. Brasher, of Brasher and Co.; Cecil H. Thompson, of the Anglo-Canadian Lumber Co., and Byron G. Cohen of Wilson and Cohen. Two of the best known men in northern Alberta, Dr. M. E. Grimshaw, Peace River, and Samuel G. McCoppey, Edmonton, are also on the board.

Their company, Peace River Petroleum, Ltd., is on the ground floor of the tremendous development that is now taking place in the great oil fields of Canada's new northwest. They already have two wells, their holdings including those staked early by the Consolidated Peace River Petroleum company, and the Anglo-Canadian Lumber Co., and the Smoky River Petroleum Co., and the well being sunk deeper into the more prolific oil formations. One of the wells has 13-inch casing to 900 feet, a fact which will recognize as highly important. W. C. Goffart & Co. are the official selling agents for the company. Mr. Goffart is a pioneer in the Peace River

country, and knows its resources as do few Canadians. The company of the Toronto men, all of whom are heavy investors, propose very broad development under highly technical direction.

Other Big Companies. The amount of money expended in the opening up of what bears promise of becoming the most extensive oil field in the world is extraordinary. Winnipeg has just announced the formation of the Anglo-Canadian Petroleum Co., to exploit the resources of this district. Leading in this company are the Earl of Murray, Lord Kinsale, Sir Thomas Dixon, and Lt.-Col. C. K. H. Bury, D.S.O. Their company has a capitalization of one hundred million dollars, all subscribed.

The Standard Oil Co., thru its imperial, have had a dozen of the best oil geologists on the continent covering the Peace River, and other parts of the west, this last season, and all of the rest of the world's largest oil companies, like the Shell, are most actively interested. The fight that is being waged out there, with millions as weapons, makes one of the most interesting and absorbing pages in the history of the country. Stories of the battles fought for Canadian lumbering privileges, romantic as they were, are insignificant in comparison.

The Toronto men, who make their preliminary announcement in this issue, are fortunate in having got on the ground early, and in having secured many of the most valuable locations ahead of the big oil corporations.

MONTREAL PRODUCE MARKET.

Montreal, Nov. 30.—An earlier feeling prevailed in market for oats, and prices

Ash had Malaga grapes, selling at \$15 to \$17 per keg; Emperor grapes at \$8 per keg; Smyrna figs at 40c to 45c per lb.; raisins at \$7.50 per case of 20 lb.; California lemons at \$4 to \$5 per case; arbutus at \$4 to \$4.50 per case; lemons at \$5 to \$5.50 per case; potatoes at \$2.50 per bag; cabbage at \$2.75 per bag; beets and parsnips at \$1.50 per bag.
