Ladies' Shirt Waist—1911.—There is nothing more attractive for women's wear than the shirt waist and this season there has been more variety than ever. The shirt waist closed at the back has become very popular. A dainty waist is here shown and one that would be suitable for almost every woman and could be made to advantage in any of the sheer materials for summer and spring wear. This design has a yoke that could be made very attractive with attached bands of contrasting material. Insertions, braids or all-over lace. Clusters of small tucks or gathers provide a graceful amount of fullness in front. The sleeves, which are in Bishop style, can be made in long or shorter length and finished with deep cuff or bands of trimming for shorter length sleeve. The pattern is cut in 5 sizes, 32 to 40 bust measure. For medium size 3 yards of material, 27 inches wide or 1 1/2 yards 44 inches wide, with one-half yard of all-over lace 18 inches wide, is required.

Parisian Hats of Fall Millinery.

Of course it is in Paris that we look for the most reliable forecast concerning fall millinery. And what are they wearing there? Every size—big hats and little hats, set high upon the head with tulle-filled bandeaux, hats with long veils and streamers, mob-caps, tiny caps and turbans—most of these in their small, as by great plumes or sweeping feathers of fantasy.

Everything is to be seen in the size and shape of the hat, so it is hard to fix upon any definite style. It is pretty safe to say, however, that all the ostrich feathers of the fall season shall be de frises, or uncured. This style was tentative last year; this year it has become imperative. When the ostrich feather is very wide, and its separate fronds consequently very long, the effect is graceful enough, when the fronds are not too straight and stiff. Any attempt at an uncured plume when the ostrich feather is not both heavy and wide, is disastrous. Narrow ostrich feathers, when uncured, only look like the straggly end of a worn-out feather duster.

That the other novelty in summer hats—the long veil draped about the head and descending in streamers far below the waist—will endure is more than unlikely. This veil may be of tulle, mousseline de soie, tulle or silk, and is used upon big hats and little hats indiscriminately. It is, however, a definite piece of trimming upon the hat—in fact, it constitutes the principal trimming, and is not to be confounded with the long veils, detachable, that were worn a season or so ago. After being fixed in drapery upon the hat, the veil descends very long over the shoulders, quite to the knees, and further. It is often worn thrown around the throat once, and then allowed to hang.

Also winter will hardly encourage the employment of these veils, the same eschewed idea of having something fall from the hat upon the shoulders will probably persist in the employment of velvet ribbons and such. This movement is already seen in some of the most costly of summer hats. One fascinating little French actress who has just captured a surprised London public, wears a large black hat with a black veil, trimmed with two huge white plumes, and from which hang two or three long streamers of inch-wide black velvet ribbon.

Silk Waists Again.

Paris is seducing our charming examples of soft, lustrous taffeta, in plain or checked weaves, and trimmed in a variety of fetching modes.

Buttons are a noticeable trimming feature, these usually being in some dark shade and harmonious color, which makes for a pretty contrast with the lighter silk of the waist. On waists of plain or checked silk this darker trimming note is further increased by telling effect by the use of a plain silk in the form of pipings. For instance, a navy blue and white striped waist, check taffeta is given much character by a yoke trimming in the form of a tulle, edged with colored piping of plain blue silk and set with small black-covered buttons in the same blue shade. The result is a touch of dressing and afforded by yoke, collar and cuff insets of Irish crochet.
