The Sixth Annual General Meeting of the Shareholders of the Union Trust Company, Limited, was held at the Company's Office, in the Temple Building, at 11 o'clock on Tuesday, 26th February, 1907.

The President submitted the following Report for 1906:

DIRECTORS' REPORT, 1906.

The Directors of The Union Trust Company, Limited, beg to submit their Sixth Annual Report with Statement of Assets and Liabilities and Profit and Loss Account for the year ending 31st December, 1906.

The net profits for the year, after making provision for cost of management, salaries, fees and expenses of every kind, \$188,898 85, adding amount at credit of Profit and Loss Account, December 31st, 1906, \$8,955 90

Total at the credit of Profit and Loss Account, \$197,854 75

Which has been appropriated as follows:

Dividend of four per cent. for the year, \$100,000 00

Added to Reserve, \$100,000 00

Balance of Profit and Loss Account carried forward, \$2,854 75

Your Directors have decided to open a Branch Office in Winnipeg, Manitoba, under the management of Mr. J. M. McWhinney, from which point it is intended to supervise the Company's business in the Western Provinces. It is also the intention to open a Branch Office in Hamilton, Ontario, where temporary premises have been secured.

Owing to the expansion of the general business of the Company, additional office room was necessary, and the present offices were leased for the accommodation of the Executive, Mortgage, Bond and Trust Departments, leaving the offices on the ground floor for the use of the Safety Deposit Vault and Land Department.

A General Real Estate Commission business has been added to the Land Department, including management and renting of buildings, collection of rents, and the buying and selling of city and country properties, on commission.

The Securities held by the Company have been carefully examined by the Inspection Committee and reported upon to the Board of Directors.

The Auditors have made the usual monthly audit of the Cash, Bank Accounts and Books of the Company, and have made an independent examination of the Securities, and their Certificate is appended to the Financial Statements.

SURPLUS OVER \$400,000 PUBLIC ACCOUNTS SHOW

Hon. Col. Matheson Presents an Interesting Budget of Figures to the House.

Hon. A. J. Matheson laid the estimates and the public accounts before the legislature yesterday, and announced that he expected to make his financial statement to-morrow.

The summary of the estimates for the year shows a total of \$6,519,131.23.

This is composed of \$5,586,455.28 for current expenditure for 1907, \$624,335 on capital account, and \$298,341 for other purposes. This is \$201,047.75 less than the total expenditure for 1906, and leaves a good margin yet for the supplementary estimates.

The votes under 15 heads show considerable progress in the adjustment and redistribution of accounts, so that the expenditure of a similar character are brought together. As a minor illustration the items for clearing in the parliament buildings were formerly distributed among the several departments. They are now lumped together in one sum.

Civil government shows an increase of \$102,852, the total being \$530,932. Expenditure increases in salaries are shown in some instances.

The Ontario railway and municipal board are generously treated, the chairman getting \$10,000 a year, of the prime minister, while the other two members rank with cabinet ministers. The railway board is put down for \$30,000 in all.

For Education.

The education department gets \$5000 more, chiefly salaries. Lands, mines and forests jumps up \$24,000 to \$10,600, largely due to salaries and contingencies.

The union of the fisheries and game departments is the chief novelty in the public works department, but there is little change in the totals of \$50,150. The treasury department varies little at \$21,125, and the prevented auditor's office claims \$14,500. The provincial secretary's department rises from \$11,640 to \$14,670. Of this \$3000 for a new filing system, and \$3500 transferred from miscellaneous for automobile tags and law enforcement are novelties. Inspection of public institutions takes \$5000 extra for temporary assistance. The board of health gets \$7000 more for practical work.

For Agriculture.

The department of agriculture will spend \$800 more this year with \$426.75 to start with. Out of this account for \$15,150, an \$200 increase.

Legislation will cost \$24,500; administration of justice \$612,394. District judges get \$4000 under the new act. The new district of Sudbury is not yet provided for.

Education totals \$1,996,268, an increase of \$18,000. The general university and S. P. S. grants are excluded from this, and the amount thus removed balances the new grants to public and separate schools. The increase from \$29,118 to \$49,946 of \$20,828, in a sum of \$10,000.

In agriculture the total is increased \$25,000, to \$185,433. The dairy department gets \$8000 less, most of which is saved from the Ottawa Fair.

Colonization.

Colonization and immigration requires \$46,065, an increase of \$100,000, being spent in Great Britain.

Hospitals and charities receive \$30,884, \$8000 being saved from grants for consumptives.

Government buildings require \$87,795, and \$339,685, most of which is on capital account. This includes votes for Brockville, Coburg, Hamilton, Kingston, London, Mississauga, Ottawa, Peterborough, Woodstock, the General Prison and the Mercer Reformatory.

The new normal schools are down for \$200,000, half of which is on capital account. The Ontario Agricultural College is down for \$70,525.

Public works include bridges and other structures, totaling \$136,200; \$100,000 over 1906. For colonization \$1,000,000, half last year's amount, for gratuities; \$50,000 for the consumptives; \$10,000 for status for Hon. John Sandfield Macdonald; \$200 for the Batoche column tablet; \$200 for the South African monument; and \$2000 for the Bell telephone memorial.

The Surplus.

Hon. A. J. Matheson has accomplished more than he ventured to promise in producing a surplus of \$129,229.32. The total receipts for 1906 were \$7,149,131.23, and the expenditure \$6,919,901.91.

The provincial treasurer also shows cash on hand at the close of the year of \$2,497,222.62, and the balance of the proceeds of the sale of Ontario government bonds and stock for \$3,000,000. The T. and N. O. Railway paid \$158,754.47 from their earnings, which covers the interest, charges and sinking fund, and which appears in cross entry.

The cash and debenture assets of the province are shown to be, in bank balances, \$2,497,222.62; sinking fund, \$2,701,259.78; total, \$5,198,482.40.

Trust funds held by the Dominion amount to \$3,392,848.

The liabilities of the province consist of debts due to the Dominion, as settled by arbitration, \$1,731,191; and \$547,000; a grand total of (fixed) liabilities of over \$15,000,000. In indirect liabilities for the Dominion General, Niagara Falls Park bonds and the C. N. Railway, there are \$6,970,000 more.

The total expenditure for 1906 was \$5,586,455.28, for 1907, \$5,586,455.28, and the estimates for 1907 come to \$6,519,131.23.

DIED IN A VACANT LOT.

Pulpwood Concessions
