## FLY-PAPER POLITICS.

In an article headed, "What the Two Parties are Doing," The Toronto Globe professes to see in the revelations of scandal in the private lives of certain ministers and certain members of parliament only the work of mosquitoes and black flies.

It says: "Messrs. Fisher, Foster and Company are playing the role of the black flies and mosquitoes, but the people's work is done, and the great ends achieved in spite of their humming and buzzing and biting."

Many cynical things have been given expression in the editorial columns of The Toronto Globe, but nothing quite so cynical has seen the light of print as this deliberate closing of the eyes to the infamy rampant within the portals of the government. Through Canada, the chief editor of The Globe has been heralded as the great exponent of public righteousness. How he can reconcile his mosquito and black fly epistle with an adequate conception of public duty passes the understanding of the man on the street.

In view of the fact that in The Calgary Eye-Opener of June 29, a copy of which has been received in The World Office, cabinet ministers are associated by name with scandalous acts, the question cannot be downed. Are these things true or are they false? If they are not true, they should be denied, and the paper making the accusations should be proceeded against in the courts. What has been common talk on the street has been published in this western paper and copies of it have been scattered broadcast through the west. This is the scandal, nobody dares to deny that these statements are true.

It may be correct that some Congressmen are trying to make political capital out of the scandalous actions of certain cabinet ministers, but that is not the question. This is the question: Are these things true and what has The Globe to say about it? Clergymen down by the sea have been passing strong resolutions, having in mind these same actions. If comment on circumstances involving a grave public scandal and calls for purity of life in ministers of the crown be only the buzzing and the humming of mosquitoes and black flies, does the Rev. J. A. Macdonald mean to put his brethren in the category of insects?

In the hour of George Brown, the mosquito and black fly epistle would have found its way into the editorial columns of The Globe. But Macdonald is a day's journey along a dusty road from Brown.

## SCOTSMEN AND MOOR.

Scotland more than any other European nation has been identified with the soldier of fortune. For this sufficient reason can be found in her turbulent history, the peculiar qualities fostered by the clan system, and the long odds between the Highlands and Lowlands and the Scottish and English landlords. Men accustomed to raids and fringes, whose only asset was their personal courage and skill in the art of war, found their occupation gone when the strong arm of law and order began to prevail. Finding business cir-

cumscribed at home, they sold their services freely elsewhere. Scottish regiments fought against each other under Gustavus, Adolphus and Wallenstein, and for many a long year afterwards the Scot was found seeking reputation and profit at the cannon's mouth under every standard in Christendom and beyond.

The other day a Scottish soldier of fortune died in the United States, poor and obscure, whose boast it was that he had served under forty flags. To-day another of the fraternity is a prisoner in the hands of a Moroccan bandit. Sir Harry Aubrey de Vere Maclean, to give him his proper name and title, has had a career quite as remarkable and honorable as any scion of the clan Gillean, of whom its annals bear record. Kaid Maclean resigned his commission in the British army in 1876, and they became "instructor in drill and discipline" in the army of the Sultan of Morocco.

Possibly the tribal customs of that North African state woke some of the stammering chords inherited from his distant forebears, and certain it is that he became popular in quite an unusual degree among the Moors. Towards this other of his characteristics have no doubt contributed. Bold as the boldest of his ancestors, a splendid horseman and first-rate marksman, ready at any time to take risks, and true to his clan, Kaid Maclean is a typical Scottish soldier of fortune.

Sir Harry belongs to that sept of his clan known as the Macleans of Drimlin, and many of his kinsmen are to be found on this side the Atlantic. His present plight is due to his response to the call of duty and his confidence in his popularity, even among Moorish bandits. Ransomed, the insurgent leader, who has already caused so much trouble and even brought a European war within measurable distance, apparently could not resist the chance that placed in his hands so valuable a hostage. His demands certainly do not err on the side of moderation, and now that the Belgian government has issued a demand that immediate steps be taken to insure the Kaid's release, Morocco will become more of a problem than ever. Meantime the prisoner will be adding another to his numerous thrilling experiences, and is no doubt bearing his ill-fortune with the stoicism and resourcefulness that distinguished his clansmen of the olden time.

**THE CARE OF BOILERS.**

I noted the query of Enquirer in today's World. As I have a large number of heating boilers under my charge a description of my method of preparing them for the summer may interest your correspondent and others. In the spring I empty the boilers and clean them internally (where possible) and with water. I then completely fill them with water and close all outlet valves. In the fall I empty out the water and refill to the desired level. It is a very poor plan to half fill boilers with water for the summer, as the chemical action of the combined air and dampness from the water is liable to attack the steel or wrought iron plates of the boiler. Where the boiler is of cast iron rust damage will happen to it whether it is filled or empty. Cast iron will resist the corroding effects of dampness where steel or wrought iron will not. A perfectly dry boiler is the best, and exterior is liable to be attacked by the application of a little heat—a few shavings burned under it will do. The use of a dish of unslacked lime is introduced into the emptied and dried boiler, and moisture which might get in from the exterior is liable to be absorbed by the lime. Your correspondent can take his pick of the foregoing, but my favorite method is the completely filled boiler.

## IMPROVE WICKSON-AVE BEFORE EXTENDING IT

Residents Are Willing—Extension of Harbord-Street is Again Recommended.

The civic works committee, after visiting Wickson-avenue yesterday afternoon, came to the conclusion that, while the extension of the north end thereof was desirable, it was necessary that the present roadway should be paved, and concrete sidewalks laid down. At a conference afterwards held with a number of interested ratepayers, the latter expressed themselves as desiring that they should be assessed for the improvements, and the committee will so recommend to the city council.

The forcing thru of the extension of Harbord-street to Ossington-avenue is again recommended.

For the prevention of further accidents at the Bay-street crossing of the Esplanade, the board of control yesterday decided to ask the Grand Trunk to construct a fence about 50 feet long, so that pedestrians would be deterred from going around the gates to effect a crossing.

**SALES.**

During the half year ending June 30, the city has disposed of 127 parcels of tax sale land for a total of \$85,972.25, the unpaid taxes being \$36,822.27, so that the city's profit is \$49,150.12. For a like period in 1906, 119 parcels were sold for a total of \$76,140, on which was due \$41,888.05, the profit being \$34,251.95.

The assessment commissioner explains that, whereas the result of the John Russell tax sale was, in the opinion of the city council, a decided improvement, the purchase of the land, intended purchasers timid, the legislation since obtained has restored confidence.

An application from the Toronto Electric Light Co. for permission to erect a sub-station on the exhibition grounds to supply the 800 horse-power required, was presented by Mr. J. H. Orr, who explained that the company didn't want any permanent alterations to the city hall front, and the amount of electric light used last year would be required this year. The board decided to grant the permission asked.

The board disapproved of the parks committee's recommendation that a portion of the Electric Light Co. property on the Exhibition grounds be dedicated to park use. The proposal that \$4500 be spent in building a sidewalk along Lake Shore-road will be reported on by the city engineer.

## Can Pay for the Honor.

The Glass Blowers' Association, which opens its convention here on Monday, desires to have the initials of its organization, in illuminated letters, under the illuminated "Welcome" sign at the city hall front. The board of control was willing to grant that the association will meet the cost.

Street Railway Manager Fleming, in discussing the action of the jury in the Weir case in censuring the street car company for the use of cars, said brakes of the cars were tried and proved unsatisfactory.
