Corn %c higher, entirely in sympathy with wheat and provisions, more particularly provisions, as higher provisions mean higher hogs, and much corn is marketed in the shape of hogs. The corn news to-day was rather bearlish. Receipts 663 cars; 900 estimated for to-morrow, and probably liberal receipts all the week, with cash No. 2 and No. 3 corn dragging. The visible supply showed a large increase—1,532,000 bushels—and the stock in Chicago shows the largest increase in some time—1,319,000 bushels—and will probably show another good increase next week. While believing in higher prices for corn ultimately, we can see no good reason for an advance to-day, and if provisions weaken we think corn may go back around 29c. We believe, however, it is a purchase on the weak spots. We usually get our lowest prices in January and February.

Oats quiet, but stronger, in sympathy with corn. We should not recommend purchases above 20c, and at 20½c or over think they may be a sale for a little profit.

THE RIFLES DECIDED ON THOUSAND MARTINI-EN.

FIELDS TO BE PURCHASED.

The Lee-Metford for the Regulars and the Other Arm for the Volunteers-Write Northumberland Issued-Mr. Boyd Manitoba Elections-Toronto Horse

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—The Government has decided upon its line of action with reference to the rearmament of the militia forces. It was generally thought in militia circles that the Lee-Metford rifls would be procured for the forces generally, but it is now proposed to confine the use of this weapon to the permanent force. The authorities consider that as the mechanism of the Lee-Metford is very delicate there would be great danger of the weapon; getting out of order in the hands of unskilled men. With the permanent force, however, this objection would not hold. Col. Lake, quartermaster-general, is meeting with every assistance from the War Office and the Horse Guards, and before he leaves England a contract will have been entered into for supplying Canada with 40,000 stand of Martini-Enfield rifles, This new weapon will have the Martini lock and action with the Enfield barrel, or a modification of it. The regular Enfield has four grooves, but the new weapon will be cofined to three grooves. This change will render the rifle less liable to fouling. The Lee-Metford, it may be remarked, has a seven-grooved barrel, and one of the chief objections to it, in the opinion of competent authorities, is fouling, to which it is subject. The Martini-Enfield will take 303 bullet, the same as the Lee-Metford, so that the regulars at Halifax, the permanent force of Canada, and the militia will all use the same ammunition. With bayonet attached, the rifle will weigh about nine pounds, and will, without doubt, prove a most serviceable weapon. The cost of this large consignment of rifles will be in the vicinity of \$800,000.

It is understood that an Order-in-Council has been passed reappointing Mr. E. Miail to a postion of Commissioner of Standards, an office which he acceptably filled some years ago. This means an addition of \$300 a year to his salary.

The House sat with closed doors a short time this afternoon, when Sir Richard Cartwright explained how it came about that he is charged with assaulting Editor Laferriere. He denied committing an assault and asked that steps be taken better to control the crowds seeking access to the chamber.
