

## REBELLION AND RIFLES

An Anarchist Threat Made to the City Council.

### WHOSE BLUNDER IS THIS?

The Corporation Has to Pay \$3000 to Get Out of a Bad Scrape.

Yesterday's meeting of council will probably in future years be looked back to as unique in the history of municipal institutions in the Dominion. Advantage was taken of the privilege of addressing the council being extended to a deputation of citizens to openly threaten rebellion and the securing of redress of alleged wrongs by the use of the rifle. The speaker who thus abused his privileges was promptly called to order, and it is only just to say that the other members of the deputation did not in any way endorse his wild threats.

The most serious matter that engaged attention perhaps was that in which it was shown that the city was blundering by somebody in the Works Department the city had been led into a nice lawsuit, and that the only way out of it was to authorize the immediate payment of \$3000 to settle the case, which the aldermen did with the best grace they could muster under the circumstances. It will be gratifying to the taxpayers to learn that there will be an investigation to learn where the blame lies, but he will also have the satisfaction of knowing that he has to foot the bill before he can get the investigation, and will probably have forgotten all about the business before the blame is located.

An attempt was made to force on the discussion of a proposal of the Georgian Bay Aqueduct and Ship Canal Company to supply the city with water, in the absence of Ald. Preston, Leslie, Bell and one or two other members who are supposed to be in favor of accepting the offer. The sense of fair play, however, prompted the majority to decline taking advantage of the absence of the member who moved the resolution, and a fair fight will be had at the next meeting.

Ald. McMurrich, Saunders, Scott and Leslie were absent from the city yesterday, and Ald. Bell and Rowe were also absent from the meeting of council.

**SOME CORRESPONDENCE.**  
George B. Jones, manager of the Dominion Cold Storage Co., Ltd., was asking the council to take steps to bring before the Dominion and Provincial Governments a resolution that, if being taken by private enterprise aided by the municipality of Toronto in order that Government aid and encouragement may be obtained for the Toronto enterprise such as that which is received by similar concerns in other provinces.

D. J. O'Donoghue asked that a proviso be placed in the city agreement so that disputes between the company and its employees should be referred to an Arbitration Board for settlement.

Mrs. Julia Denison wrote thanking the council for aid rendered in the condolence on the occasion of the death of her husband.

The Royal Canadian Yacht Club and F. A. Noverre ask for a rebate of taxes on account of the losses caused by the non-completion of the York-street bridge.

Among the communications was one from Ald. Boustead, enclosing a copy of resolutions passed at a meeting held at St. Paul's Hall recently. The resolutions were rather drastic in the terms of references to the officials of all classes, and demanded that the Government issue paper money, and that the railways and other monopolist franchises for the benefit of the community, and asked for a change in the law on a 16 to 1 basis be adopted, and that \$175,000 be provided for relief work in the city.

Ald. Lamb wanted to refer the letter to the Committee on Bicycle Paths.

Ald. Boustead moved that a deputation appointed by the meeting be heard.

J. Alf. Livingstone spoke on the line of encouraging the old settlers and assisting them, but keeping out the whole army of idlers who had been so far from the advantage of the city's efforts to provide work.

**THE SPEAKERS COMMENCE.**  
Mr. D. A. Wall was the next speaker. He had, he said, noticed the sneering expressions with which some of the members had received the resolutions submitted. He immediately started out to dress down the council. He declared that this council and its predecessors have been responsible for the present state of affairs. "They have loaded us with millions of debt and we are your slaves at present," declared Mr. Wall. "The people are worked up to such a pitch that the same feeling is commencing to beat in the breasts of the people that beat in the breasts of others in 1837. We are not to be robbed in the next 20 years as we have been in the past 20 years. This country to-day contains four millions of slaves and one million of office holders. It was usually understood of old that the education of the people was bound up in the three R's. I wish to impress upon the council that this matter is covered by four R's."

**REBELLION AND RIFLES.**  
"The first is Rights—our rights, and we want them. Next comes Reason—and there is reason in our demands; the third is Rebellion—we are being driven to it (cries of 'Order!'); and the fourth is Rifles—which always brings the people their rights. (Loud cries of 'Order!')

Ald. Hallam and the Mayor rose at the same time, and the first-named having obtained recognition from the Mayor, proceeded to express his astonishment at His Worship sitting in the chair and allowing any man to talk treason to the council.

The Mayor called Ald. Hallam down for a piece of claptrap in endeavoring to cast a reflection upon him when he had risen at the same time as Ald. Hallam for the purpose of addressing Mr. Wall. The Mayor informed him that the intentions of the council were that each speaker should discuss the resolutions which had been presented to the council. So far he had not done that. "Your time is up," was the concluding remark to the Mayor, which was delivered with emphasis and was delivered hard to be heard further.

The Mayor: I don't think your words are proper to be used in any deliberation.

pupils of the schools also. He was opposed to the post card scheme.

After prolonged discussion, the report was adopted.

**MORE COSTLY PAVEMENTS.**  
Ald. Jolliffe put up a great fight to have the recommendation for a 24-foot brick pavement on concrete foundation on Leonard-avenue referred back.

This work was a great hardship, he declared, to recommend for ordinary streets, upon which houses rent at from \$7 to \$8 per month, an expensive pavement which will add \$4 to \$5 per foot frontage to the lot.

He instanced one case where the Engineer recommended a pavement that practically put a mortgage of \$5 per foot upon property that the owner could not sell for \$15 per foot.

Ald. Hubbard thought that the property owners were satisfied.

Ald. Lamb urged the council to adopt the report and to refer the matter to the Board of Control.

The proposal to connect the closing of the Fraser and Mowat-avenues in order to allow the Grand Trunk Railway to utilize the space between the streets was adopted.

Ald. Boustead, who suspected that there was some trickery in the matter, moved that the Mayor and Ald. Lamb be asked to explain the matter.

**SOME MORE PAVEMENTS.**  
Ald. Preston took advantage of the opportunity to enquire when and by whom some person had been appointed to look after the city's streets.

The Mayor and Ald. Lamb strongly supported the report.

Ald. Preston wanted to know whether any scale of charges for the use of the conveniences had been arranged, and if so whether the same was submitted to the Board of Control or for approval.

Ald. Lamb replied that it was the intention to make a charge in this way: The gentleman who had been appointed to take charge was to have \$2 per week and would get a tip of two cents from each person using the private compartments, but if any patron of the institution was a member of the institution he was to be charged nothing.

The worthy alderman also expressed his pleasure at being able to announce that the doors would be thrown open to the public on Monday next.

**A BAD SYSTEM.**  
Ald. Boustead at once on his feet to protest against anything like the "tip" system being adopted.

Ald. Lamb argued that it would be called "tips" the man would be entitled to receive the two cents, but would not insist upon it.

Ald. Boustead again entered his protest against the principle of paying partly by salary and partly by fees. The system was bad.

Ald. Davies objected to any charge being made at all, except in cases where necessary to cover cost of laundry of towels.

It was agreed to leave the matter to the Board of Control.

**AN EXPENSIVE BLUNDER.**  
Ald. Lamb offered a resolution authorizing the City Solicitor to settle the case of Reid & Co. v. the City for a sum not exceeding \$3000, including solicitor's costs.

He explained that this was a suit for damages caused by the filling in of Berkeley-street slip adjoining plaintiff's premises.

The Mayor said somebody had blundered and allowed the citizens to dump earth, etc., in the slip, and it would cost the sum named to dredge it out.

Ald. Boustead said that if the work there would still be a suit for damages, caused by being deprived from the use of the slip for some years.

Ald. R. H. Graham wanted to know the full facts before he would vote away \$3000. He also wanted a recommendation from the proper officer.

Ald. J. J. Graham: Does not the fact that it is admitted there has been a blunder committed by the council, and that there has been fault on the part of the Engineer?

The Mayor: That is so. But that is a matter for future discussion.
