WHERE LIBERALS HAVE DESERTED THE PEOPLE.

The World yesterday pointed out that the Minister of Railways and the Minister of Justice, as representing the Government at Ottawa (in which body the power is vested), had declined to interfere with telephone rates and had taken the side of the Bell Telephone monopoly. We also referred to a similar state of things as regards the claim of the gas consumers of Toronto, which has been delayed, if not side-tracked, by the Attorney-General of the Ross Administration in Ontario, Having said so much. The World desires to make a very blunt statement to the people of Canada, with the end in view that the people will yet insist on public ownership and control of telephones and of the gas supply in cities.

And the statement we have to make is simply this: That Mr. Robert McKay of Montreal, the executive head of the Beil Telephone Company, a very wealthy man, is so intimately connected with the Liberal party in the City of Montreal and in the Province of Quebec and is such a substantial friend in elections that he is in a position to chloroform the Government when they ought to be protecting the rights of the people, and that, as a matter of fact, Mr. McKay has succeeded in blocking any reduction of telephone rates and is paving the way for an advance; both of which things are against the rights of the people as set out in statute, is against freer communication between the people and against the general public interest. And we desire also to say, as far as Ontario is concerned, that Hon. William Mulock, who is also a very wealthy man, who has probably more money under his control than any other individual in Ontario, who is solicitor for the Consumers' Gas Company, and who is one of its large shareholders, and who has devised all the schemes of entrenchment for the Consumers', Gas Company, has, by reason of his wealth and influence and his hold upon the Ontario Government, been enabled to block and check the citizens of Toronto and the gas consumers of the city in obtaining any substantial reduction in the price of gas out of profits as provided by the solemn agreement of the Company set forth in legislation. In other words, Mr. Mulock and the Consumers' Gas Company have so strong a hold upon the men who are responsible for the administration of justice in this province and in the issuing of fiats, that by one means or another they delayed for years this matter from getting into the Courts, and are so influential to-day that they can probably delay it for many years to come unless public opinion is aroused. In connection with this claim for a reduced price of gas, on behalf of the citizens of Toronto The World has already pointed out that probably one of the largest consumers of gas is the Province itself, and that therefore the Province is entitled to a great reduction in future and to a refund for over charges in the past. The World has tried repeatedly to make this clear to the Ontario Government, and has appealed to the Legislature of the Province in regard to it, but Mr. Mulock has been more than sufficient to block justice being done to the consumers.

The straight and speedy cure for the removal of this sinister influence which organized capital invariably exercises in regard to great public franchises is the nationalization of these franchises, obtaining for the people, either in their municipal, or in their provincial, or in their federal aspect, the ownership and control of them. The World is in favor of taking over the telegraph and the telephone systems of this country any day. It could be done for a very small sum of money, probably five or seven millions of dollars, giving the shareholders a very reason-Men's Bicycle Suits, caps to match, sacque coats with buttoned patch sheep and cattle. Trade for sydney or able price for their investment, and having the telegraph and telephone systems under the control of the Postoffice Depart ment, as in England, so that that department could extend the service at the actual cost price to the people. In every state where this has been done in regard to the telegraph and telephone there has been a very great advantage to the public. Rates have been cut in two, in some cases in fourths, and in every instance immense advantage has been conferred. As far as the Gas Company is concerned, it could to-day be taken over by the city, with its whole plant, paying the shareholders a reasonable price for their investment; and, having done that, the people of Toronto could have gas at 50 cents a thousand, instead of almost double that amount, which they are now paying. Everybody knows what cheap gas fuel means to the people of Toronto. It means getting rid of all the nuisance of coal and

coal supply to the house. It means getting rid of the ash nuisance. It means that every housekeeper is in a position to regulate fires to a nicety, and to put them out, start them or keep them down as may be required to any degree, and with the least possible amount of labor. The comfort of every household in Toronto can be largely augmented by cheap gas tuel. And yet Mr. Mulock is to-day in a position, as proved by the facts, to block the attainment of this desirable end. Mr. Robert McKay of Montreal is in a similar position as regards the tele-

phone service of the country.

We ask the people of Canada, and especially the people of Toronto, to take this into their consideration, and to declare, whenever the opportunity arrives, that they are in favor of public ownership of these franchises, and that they are decidedly against any man, or body of men, by reason of their own wealth or relation with a company, being in a position to dictate a policy to or paralyze the arm of men who are elected to perform a high public trust. And it is to the discredit of the Liberal party, or rather to the leaders of the Liberal party, that they have been found wanting in this matter and have abandoned the people in preference for the rich. And it is for the reasons above set out, if for no others, that Mr. Ross is unworthy of being Premier of Ontario and Sir Wilfrid Laurier of being Premier of Canada. They have each of them and both of them surrendered the rights of the people to monopolies. And each of them and both of them have been making life-long protestations that they are champions of the people! Mr. Blair, Minister of Railways, and Mr. David Mills, Minister of Justice, are in the same boat. As for Mr. Mulock, he is in both boats: he is also party to entrenching the telephone monopoly. And he is the prime mover in the gas monopoly. And yet this is the same Mr. Mulock who, before he was found out, used to rave against the coal oil monopoly, the binder twine monopoly, the agricultural implements monopoly; and who went over the wrongs of the farmers! What do the honest farmers of North York think of it all? Does Mr. Mulock's great wealth glamor their eyesight? Mr. Mulock's idea of them is that they are his meat. He humbugged them over monopolies, in order to get into power; and once in power he uses his position to strengthen the hold of monopolies on the people!

POLITICAL INTELLIGENCE.

A. E. Blount, private secretary to Charles Tupper, was in the city yesterday. Sir Charles Tupper will reach Montreal Sunday morning. He will not get off at Quebec, like Messrs. It would be dangerous for Sir Wilfrid to 'swap horses crossing a river.' There is little doubt that Tarte is the real master of the administration, and no matter how much the Ontario Liberals may object what he says will go."

Among politicians in Quebec, Tarte is looked upon as a wonder in raising a campaign fund.

Down in East Durham there are rumors of T. Dixon Craig, M.P., getting out, on the grounds that he is a non-resident, and there are other Conservatives after the nomination. Mr. Craig has been in the House since 1891, having succeeded Harry Ward, also a Conservative. He is a temperance advocate, and by his course in Parliament has shown much independence. There is no doubt that Mr. Craig's name will go before the convention to be held shortly. He has great financial and personal interests in East Durham, and hopes these will counteract any influence his non-residence may have against him.

Two other names are likely to be put up against Mr. Craig. Harry Ward, ex.M.P., and Barlow Cumberland, are both residents of East Durham, and are said to bave political ambitions. The names of Lieut. Col. McLean, a former candidate, and Dr. Powers, are spoken of as possible Liberal nominees.

On Tuesday last there was in Windsor a big gathering of the vice-presidents of the North Essex Liberal Association to decide upon the date of a convention. One of the vice-presidents opened his heart sufficiently to announce that William McGregor, the present member, would be the Liberal nominee.

In 1896 Mr. Craig was opposed by Lieut.-Coi. McLean, an independent Liberal and well-known merchant of Port Hope. The vote stood 1767 to 1598, for Craig.
