CHICAGO, Jan. 26.—The market for cattle today was active so far as good droves were concerned.

Prices, there being the usual scarcity of the better class of heavy matured beefs; the common to poor quality was not particularly active, and most sellers called prices for such 5¢ to 10¢ lower; fancy cattle brought \$5 to \$10; choice steers, \$5 50 to \$5 75; medium steers, \$5 to \$5 25; beef steers, \$4 to \$4 50; stockers and feeders, \$3 35 to \$4 75; bulls, \$2 75 to \$4 25; cows and heifers, \$3 30 to \$4; western fed steers, \$4 10 to \$5 50; Texas steers, \$3 90 to \$5 25; calves, \$3 50 to \$7. The supply of hogs exceeded the demand, and sales ruled 5¢ lower; fair to choice, \$3 75 to \$3 85; packing lots, \$3 50 to \$3 70; mixed, \$3 50 to \$3 75; butchers, \$3 55 to \$3 80; light, \$3 45 to \$3 72½; pigs, \$3 20 to \$3 55. Competition among buyers of sheep was brisk, and prices advanced 1¢ to 2¢; inferior to choice sheep brought \$2 90 to \$4 25; ewes, \$3 60 to \$3 80; yearling wethers, \$4 to \$6; western lambs, \$4 65 to \$4 90; feeders, \$4 25 to \$4 75. Receipts: Cattle, 12,000; hogs, 40,000; sheep, 17,000.

EAST BUFFALO, Jan. 26.—Cattle—The offerings were about three loads.

The offerings were a fair demand, and prices steady. Calves were in moderate improved demand; choice to extra were quotable at \$7 25 to \$7 75; good to choice, \$7 to \$7 50; the prospects are for higher prices. Sheep and lambs.

The offerings were moderate—22 loads; the general condition of the market was about the same as yesterday; the basis being 5¢, with a few sales a little higher; lambs, choice to extra, \$4 85 to \$5; good to choice, \$4 75 to \$4 85; common to good, \$4 50 to \$4 60; good to choice, \$4 to \$4 25; the offerings were pretty well cleaned up. Hogs—The offerings were not large, but sufficient for demand, which was not strong enough to maintain prices at yesterday's figures, and a decline of 10¢ resulted; Yorkers were quotable at \$3 75 to \$3 80; medium and mixed, \$3 50 to \$3 65; good heavy, \$3 95 to \$4; only a few at the outside prices; the close was about steady.

MONTREAL, Jan. 25.—The receipts at the east end abattoir this morning were 400 head of cattle, 25 calves, 50 sheep and 100 lambs. The weather was clear, and there was a large number of buyers. Good cattle sold at 44¢ to 45¢ per lb., lower grades at 2¢ to 3¢ per lb. Calves sold at \$3 to \$10, according to size. Good sheep brought from 3¢ to 3½¢ per lb., and rams from 2¢ to 2½¢ per lb. Lambs sold at 4¢ to 4½¢ per lb. Hogs sold at \$4 20 to \$4 40.

CALL TO GUELPH WAS SET ASIDE

Rev. A. J. McGillivray Decides to Remain

With the Congregation of St. James' in This City.

This Means That the Church Will Go North—Presbytery Deals With a Number of Remits From the Assembly.

THURSDAY.

At yesterday afternoon's meeting of the London Presbytery, held in the First Presbyterian Church, discussion of the call to Rev. A. J. McGillivray, of St. James' Church, city, to St. Andrew's Church, Guelph, was resumed.

Rev. D. C. Johnson was the first speaker from St. James' Church. He repelled the charge that they had not implemented their engagement with their pastor, and made a strong plea for his retention.

Messrs. Gray, McNeil, Brown and Wyatt all made earnest and really very clever speeches.

Col. McCrae replied on behalf of the Guelph delegation, and several questions were put to the representatives.

Rev. Robert Johnston, of St. Andrew's, made a statement concerning the work that his church had gathered in the northern part of the city. St. Andrew's had undertaken to present the mission property free of incumbency, to the congregation of St. James', and also a contribution of \$200 a year for two years.

Rev. Mr. Clark said he did not feel it necessary to make any statement at this time, inasmuch as Mr. McGillivray knew his mind in relation to the proposed northward movement.

On motion, the commissioners were removed from the bar and the call put in Mr. McGillivray's hands, when he asked for a short time to consider the matter.

Rev. Mr. Johnston reported in regard to the arrears of Kintore congregation to their late pastor, Rev. J. Munro. For the years 1896-8 he received at the rate of \$600. The committee had no recommendation to make.

It was moved by Rev. Mr. Henderson, seconded by Rev. Mr. Clark, that after hearing the report the presbytery had no ground for taking action.

Rev. R. Johnston presented the report of the committee on remits from synod and assembly.

The first item was in regard to the appointment of an evangelist by the synod, and the committee's recommendation that evangelistic work be conducted by settled ministers within the bounds of each presbytery, rather than by a permanent appointee, was adopted by the presbytery.

The second remit was in regard to the statistical report of the church. The recommendation of the committee was in favor of the remit as sent down. It was received, and the discussion of it postponed until the March meeting.

The next remit was in regard to the appointment of synodical home mission committees. The committee recommended that this course be followed, and it was accepted by the presbytery.

The next remit was on the matter of a uniform examination for students coming up for license, and the committee's recommendation was that such a course should be followed. It was decided that this item should be left over till the meeting in March for discussion.

The presbytery decided against the reduction of representation in the assembly from one-fourth to one-sixth.

At this stage Mr. McGillivray stated, after certain explanations in regard to the history of St. James' since his coming to the city, that he felt it to be his duty to remain in London.

It was moved by Mr. Stuart, seconded by Dr. Proudfoot, that the call be set aside.

Expression of opinion was given by Messrs. Clark and Johnson, as well as the mover and seconder, expressing gratification at the decision arrived at by Mr. McGillivray, and the motion was unanimously carried.

Col. McCrae expressed his regret, but also his hope that God would bless Mr. McGillivray in his work that he would never regret his decision.

On motion, Mr. McGillivray was appointed convener of the committee on Church Life and Work in the Presbytery.

It was reported that the congregations of First Church, St. Andrew's and St. James' Churches, London, had increased the stipends of their respective pastors.

The moderator and clerk were authorized to sign necessary documents, if St. James' congregation, in due order, disposed of their present property.

The remit of the assembly
