Eleven Men Injured in a Fire at Cambridge, Mass.

Heavy Loss at Perry, Iowa-Thirteen Miles of Mountain-Side Swept by Flames Near St. Louis.

LOSS HALF A MILLION. Chicago, Nov. 21.-A special to the Tribune from Perry, Iowa, says: At is beyond control. A strong northwest wind is sweeping the town, both sides of Second street. Several large brick blocks are already gone, and the fire department is helpless to stay the \$500,000.

ELEVEN MEN INJURED. Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 21.-A fire which broke out in the building devoted to the manufacture of lard at the pork packing establishment of John P. Squire & Co., at East Cambridge, this morning, resulted in serious injury to eleven men, four of whom it is feared will die, and a property loss estimated at \$80,000. THIRTEEN MILES OF FLAME.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 21.—A special to the Republic from Macomb, Mo., says: The largest and most destructive conflagration that has ever swept the Ozark Mountains since 1884 is now threatening this town. The fire extends for miles and miles, north of and parallel with the Memphis Railroad. The autumn heavy foliage has rapidly fallen since the frost, and is supposed to have been fired from sparks of freight engines. A scope of country thirteen miles long is in flames. Miles of fences, orchards, plantations, farms and dry pasture fields, stocked with cattle and other animals, and many old settlers' homes lie directly in the line of the fire. Neighborhoods find themselves totally unable to check the flames, and their only remedy is to hurriedly turn out stock ahead of the flames and desert the premises. The altitude being 1,760 feet above the sea, and a terrible southwesterly wind prevailing, great destruction is imminent. The town of Macomb will probably be destroyed.
