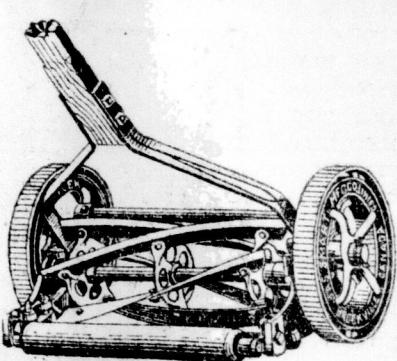

**SANATORIUM SOCIETY
HAS JUST ENDED BEST
YEAR IN ITS HISTORY**

Mrs. John Stevely Elected as
New President.

MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

Nurses Made Nearly Four
Thousand Visits in Past
Twelve Months.

The annual meeting of the Woman's
Sanatorium Aid Society was held at
the residence of Mrs. J. C. Judd, Rid-
out street, Thursday afternoon. When
the reports for the year were received.
The nurses' report showed great activ-
ity. 1,260 patients taking advantage of
the free examination and treatment at
the clinic in Victoria Hospital. The
number of nurses' visits for the year
totaled 3,951. Number of families suf-
fering from tuberculosis, 355.

Mrs. Charles White, who has con-
ducted a most successful paper cam-
paign for the past three years, was
given a standing vote of thanks for
her untiring efforts in this work.

The treasurer's report showed an ex-
penditure of \$1,008 for the year, which
did not include the Christmas cheer.
The officers were re-elected by ac-
clamation, as follows: President, Mrs.
John Stevely; first vice-president, Mrs.
Ziegler; second vice-president, Mr.
John Stevenson; third vice-president,
Mrs. Wm. Vaughn; secretary, Mrs. B. C.
McCam; treasurer, Mrs. A. B. Greer.

Secretary's Report.

Following is the secretary's report for
the year 1916:

"For the past seven years it has
been my pleasure and privilege to bring
before you a report of the work ac-
complished during the year.

While each succeeding year shows
that we have increased our work, it
tells us that our responsibilities are
rapidly increasing in the war against
the white plague.

"In reviewing the former reports, the
fact which is most impressive is the
large increase in the number of pa-
tients who present themselves at the
clinic in Victoria Hospital. This does
not prove that tuberculosis is increas-
ing in our midst, but the splendid work
that our nurses have been doing since
the inception of our society is beginning
to bear fruit, and also an evidence that
the people are waking up to the fact
that help is offered them to assist them
to fight a disease which is so deadly,
unless arrested in the earliest stage.

Distressing Cases.

"Invaluable, too, is the instruction
given patients, that they may know
how to protect others with whom the
come in contact. Frequently distressing
cases are found where people have suf-
fered from the carelessness or ignorance
of some inmate of their home who is
absolutely ignorant of the nature of
the disease and of the precaution nec-
essary to safeguard others. The severe
weather last winter brought with it
great deal of suffering, and our devo-
ted nurses, Misses Hanson and Baron
were untiring in their efforts to me-
tigate the increased demands upon their
time. It also meant an enlarged demand
upon funds, which, with the high cost
of the bare necessities of life, diminish-
ed in the most alarming manner.

Generous Response.

"It was with misgivings that the so-
ciety undertook to provide the custom-
ary Christmas cheer for their patient.
However, at an appeal for assistance
brought a generous response from the
charitable citizens. The sum of \$4
was received. Thus we were able to
furnish upwards of 50 families with
baskets filled with groceries, vegeta-
bles and meat, and the surplus was de-
voted to supplying delicacies for the in-
curable cases. Mr. McGarvey, one of our in-
valuable members, showed his usual kind
interest in our work by making an
contributing numerous warm garments
for the little ones of the afflicted fam-
ilies.

"The disposal of a beautifully-dressed
doll, the contribution of Miss Lipsey,
realized the sum of \$25.

"At our meeting in February it was
decided to furnish a ward at the Byro
Sanatorium for Tubercular Soldiers, ar-
riving from the front, and to meet the
need of the incoming year. To raise the
necessary funds it was decided to hold a
Queen Alexandra Rose Day, early in
June, and the arrangements are all
under way.

Letters of acknowledgment were sent
to all the citizens who contributed so
generously at Christmas-time."
