

Haig Congratulates Canadians Assisting In Hargicourt Raid



MARRIED MEN FIRST

Troops Celebrate Their Arrival In France by Two Raids.

CANADIAN ARMY HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, via London, Feb. 15.—By W. A. Wilson, Special Correspondent of the Canadian Press.—On the eve of an historic dinner to commemorate the arrival of the first Canadian division in France, three years ago, the Canadian troops, who are now in the front lines near Hill 70 and in front of Lens, celebrated their arrival by two raids.

Another interesting fact brought to the attention of the shareholders was the increase of over \$1,000,000 in the amount of money placed with the company for the year of investment.

At 6 o'clock this morning in front of Lens, Canadian troops, operating in two parties, carried out a raid.

These raids confirm the presence of Canadian troops opposite the Canadian lines, the prisoners taken belonging to the 1st Guards Regiment.

At this morning Canadian headquarters were the scene of a striking appreciation of the value of Canadian troops in the present campaign.

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YOUNG GIRL FOUND IN TORONTO STREET VICTIM OF CRIME

Had Been Assaulted, But She Remembers Nothing.

Toronto, Feb. 15.—With very little clothing on, Ennis Lyons, a young girl, was found lying unconscious behind a tree on Gould street this morning.

The police removed her to the general hospital, where doctors worked over her half an hour before she regained consciousness.

When the girl revived, she stated she had met a man while shopping, early on Thursday afternoon, in a downtown department store, and after a brief conversation, the pair went out together.

From that time on, she was unable to remember where she had been. Her clothing had been taken from her, and she was left on the street.

The police are trying to find out who the man was, and if possible, to locate him.

The girl is now in the hospital, and is recovering from her injuries.

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CZERNIN HOPES STRONG HOLD OF ALLIED NAVY HAS NOW BEEN BROKEN

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 15.—A dispatch received from Vienna, says that Count Czernin, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, replying to an address of the burgomaster, who welcomed him on his return to the Austrian capital, said it was the war aim of his supreme war lord and emperor,

which had secured for them a peace with the Ukraine. This peace, he added, was in a double sense of the great significance.

Peace Infections.—"What has happened at 'Brest-Litovsk,'" Count Czernin said, "is the end of the war, but it is the beginning of the end. Not only political diseases, but political infections are infectious, and peace will be so, too."

Count Czernin added that he had assurances that Austria's prisoners of war would be released. Civil war because of difficulties, but he was full of hope.

Conclusion Count Czernin said, "If ever confidence was justified, it is today. I am firmly convinced that we have only to hold out a little longer, and an honorable peace will be attained."
