Condition of Women in the Far East Mr. Ellis Addresses Ladies' Meeting

In Dundas Center Methodist
Church Yesterday
Afternoon.

The ladies of London showed plainly
yesterday afternoon that their interest
in the laymen's missionary movement
is as keen as that of the laymen, when
they gathered in large numbers at Dun-
das Center Methodist Church to hear
Mr. W. T. Ellis speak on conditions in
the Far East.

Mr. Ellis dealt more particularly yes-
terday afternoon with the conditions of
the women of the east, and the work
that a number of lady missionaries are
doing, a phase of the question that he
had not touched upon at the laymen's
meetings and which proved most in-
teresting to those present.

Women's Work.
In his opening remarks, Mr. Ellis
stated that the start of the laymen's
movement was due to the thorough and
untiring efforts of the women's mis-
sionary societies, who were doing a
peculiar work in that in trying to save
the world, they were helping to bet-
ter the condition of women in other
lands.

Women used to the free and unham-
pered life of America, would soon tire

if they were compelled to live in such
a restricted and secluded manner as
the women of the east.

Probably no women in the world
were situated in an environment where
the tendency to narrow her in every
way was so great as in the east.

Mr. Ellis spoke particularly of the
work that was being done among the
Chinese women in the district of Pas-
ting Fu by Miss Annie Gowans, a lady
missionary, sent out by one of the On-
tario women's missionary societies.

Condition is Pitiable.
In some districts of China the con-
dition of the women is most pitiable,
in many instances being a disgrace to
any nation.

In some of the famine districts con-
ditions were such that they would have
to be seen to be realized.

Mr. Ellis, in concluding, stated that
it was necessary for the successful
missionary to minister not only to the
spiritual needs of the people, but to
their physical wants as well.

A very hearty vote of thanks to Mr.
Ellis for his excellent address, moved
by Mrs. Tilley and seconded by Mrs.
Gordon Wright, was conveyed to him
by Mrs. F. A. Stevens who presided.

During the services Mrs. Ed Wyatt
rendered a solo, which was greatly
appreciated.

Over one hundred laymen were pres-

missionary movement.

CANON ABBOTT IN ST. PAUL'S

An Interesting Address in Con-
nection With Their
Anniversary.

Rev. Canon Abbott, of Christ Church
Hamilton, was the speaker at the ser-
vice in St. Paul's Cathedral in con-
nection with the celebration of the
seventy-fifth anniversary of the estab-
lishment of the parish, and delivered
a very interesting address.

A special music was furnished by the
choir under the direction of Mr. Geo.
B. Sippl, the organist.

The subject of Canon Abbott's dis-
course was taken from the Gospel
writer's summing up of Christ's teach-
ing, "He knew what was in man."

The canon pointed out that Christ
had a deep insight into the nature of
man, and consequently looked on the
bright side of things, not on the dark
side.

Christ was an optimist, a genuine
believer in humanity, and no hurt that
he received at the hands of men
shook that supreme confidence he had
in them.

His superior insight into human
nature led him to see the great pos-
sibilities of good there were in every
man. These possibilities were not the
privilege of the few, but were the com-
mon characteristic of mankind.

Study Human Nature.
Canon Abbott advised his hearers to
study human nature, a study infinitely
more valuable than the study of
history. Men should form good opin-
ions of men. They should not be sus-
picious of each other. Businessmen
were suspicious, but this should not
be.

Every man should be counted honest
until he was found to be dishonest.
This might be poor business, declared
the speaker, but it was good Christian-
ity, and all business should be brought
to the standpoint of Christianity. He
deplored the pessimism that was
abroad, and said it spelt failure for
men. The only success was in optimis-
m, the optimism of Jesus Christ.
