

STREET CAR MEN TO CONSIDER INCREASE OF 8 CENTS AN HOUR

Mass Meeting of Employees Will Be Held Tomorrow Night.

CHARGE FIVE CENT FARE

Day of the Cheap Ride May Very Soon Be Over.

Street railway employees will be asked to consider returning to work permanently at an increase of eight cents an hour, giving them a maximum wage of 52 cents. This was the proposal which the executive of their union agreed to submit to a mass meeting Saturday night following a conference Thursday afternoon with a special committee of the council.

To obtain money for this increase it will be necessary to charge a cash fare of 5 cents and 6 tickets for a quarter for use between 6:30 and 8 a.m. and 5 and 6:30 p.m. This increase will yield the company \$154,660.45, of which \$36,000 will be absorbed by bonded indebtedness, and \$55,000 by paying. The remainder will be required for the wage increase.

Will Be Considered.
If the proposal is approved by the employees a report will be presented to the council Tuesday night. If the council also sets its approval of the decision the city solicitor will be asked to draw up a new street railway agreement. The necessary bylaw for higher fares will then be passed. The company will also have to approve the action.

The council committee first proposed that the men accept a seven-cent increase an hour, which would be obtained with a five-cent cash fare, and seven tickets for a quarter in limited hours. John Colbert, president of the union, said this was out of the question. He thought the men would not accept anything less than eleven cents an hour.


Propose Eight Cents.
The committee next proposed the eight-cent increase. Mayor Little said this was as far as it could go, and it was doubtful whether the council would approve of that.

After a conference, Mr. Colbert stated that as the increase would have to be paid directly out of the pockets of the patrons of the road, the executive was prepared to make a concession, and would recommend to the union that the increase of eight cents be accepted. Mayor Little promised that if they could discover any other means of increasing the wages without increasing the fares still higher the council would be glad to consider it. The \$55,000 required for paying was really only half the amount which should be paid, but the city was willing to concede this point. He stated that further concessions could not be made along this line, because some of the streets were in dangerous condition.

Examine Books.
It was also promised that provision would be made in the new agreement for examination of the company's books at the end of the year to determine whether it was possible to pay any higher rate of wages.

This is only a preliminary stage of the negotiations. The proposal must be ratified by the men, the council and the company.

The members of the special committee representing the city were Ald. Cameron Wilson, chairman; Ald. Bridge, Wheatcroft and Drake. The representatives of the men were John Colbert, John Ashton, B. Parker, L. Parker, F. Seelhoff and W. Constable.
