

OTTAWA FIRM TO FACE PROSECUTION

Questions Sent by Labor Department Were Not Properly Answered.

COAL DEALERS WARNED

Several Toronto Firms Have Not Made Satisfactory Statements.

Ottawa, Jan. 5.—The first prosecution under the cost of living regulations will probably take place in Ottawa. The attorney-general of Ontario has been asked by W. F. O'Connor, K.C., the cost of living commissioner, for his consent to a prosecution of one of the Ottawa firms—the name of the firm was not made public—which has failed to make a proper return to the labor department in reply to questions sent it by the department.

Mr. O'Connor has notified the Ottawa firm of what he has done, and further announced to it that he proposes to conduct any necessary investigation of its business.

There may be further prosecutions, but it is understood that this Ottawa firm has ignored completely the demand of the department for information as to its stock and prices paid, and an example will be made of that firm.

Several Toronto coal firms are in trouble, but their names have not yet been divulged. To one Mr. O'Connor writes: "It is illegal for you to fix or decide upon a price for your coal as a result of a communication or arrangement with some other dealer or dealer within your city."

To another coal firm which stated that they were "in friendly co-operation with our local competitors with a view to maintaining reasonably uniform prices and also to prevent extortion in times of scarcity of fuel," Mr. O'Connor writes that any arrangement of this kind is "illegal and criminal."

A Toronto firm includes the following as making up the expenses on its coal: Taxes on coal, 15 cents per ton; interest on investment, 20 cents per ton; upkeep of horses, 10 cents per ton; delivery charge, 55 cents per ton; and degradation expense, 25 cents per ton. The commissioner wants more explicit information regarding these costs, especially the taxes.

HONORABLY ACQUITTED AND RETURNS TO WAR

Prominent Winnipeg Surgeon Says Recruiting in West Will Improve.

Col. R. M. Simpson, the prominent Winnipeg surgeon, who returned from France to face charges arising out of the Kelly investigation, and who was honorably acquitted, was in Toronto yesterday, at the Queen's Hotel on his return journey to the front. He will sail for England next week and expects to resume charge of the surgical work in either his old hospital, No. 1 General at Etaples, France, or another Canadian hospital.

Northern Ontario Lands Are Now Worth More Money

That the great fires in Northern Ontario, are, apart from the loss of life, in reality a blessing to the district, is the statement made by the Rev. C. E. Cameron, secretary of the Baptist Home Mission Board, who has just returned from a recent visit to New Ontario. He states that farms have been cleared such an extent that a farm previously worth \$200 in the burned areas is now worth \$1000. During his visit Mr. Cameron reported that he found the Baptist mission stations greatly depleted by emigration, in two of the stations, the land was closed until after the war. Blind River and Thebes with seven appointments have only one pastor.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH

Coroner's Jury Returns Verdict in Case of Michael Etieleson. At the inquest into the death of Michael Etieleson, who was seriously injured on Dec. 21 by a C.P.R. light engine at the head of Spadina avenue, and died in the Western Hospital, Jan. 1, the verdict was accidental death. The evidence submitted showed that Etieleson, who was employed by the railway company as a construction hand, had left the heating car and been knocked down, receiving the injuries which resulted in his death. Death was due to respiratory distress. The inquest was conducted by Coroner Dr. Rowe.

GEN. JOHN HUGHES GOING TO FRONT

Will Be Accompanied by Capt. Sifton on Battle-Front Tour.

General John Hughes, accompanied by Capt. Jack Sifton, are very soon to visit the western battlefield, making an extensive tour of the section held by the Canadian forces. At present General Hughes is in Toronto. Last summer he was in command at the great C.E.F. training area at Camp Hughes in western Canada. He is a brother of Sir Sam Hughes. Capt. Sifton was wounded while fighting on the western front in France. Commencing next Monday each battalion in Toronto will put on one day during the week on field day manoeuvres in the Cedarvale district, just north of the city. The 198th Canadian Bn., Lt.-Col. John A. Cooper, commander, is scheduled to take the field on Monday morning and prevent a northern "enemy" army from "digging itself in." The enemy force is supposed to have "made an unsuccessful attack on Toronto, to be retiring slowly on its base at Newmarket, and to have left a covering force of all arms to hold the high ground just north of Cedarvale avenue. In the morning the battalion manoeuvres will be directed by the commander and in the afternoon by Major Watts, the second-in-command. New features introduced during the tactical exercises will be the representing of the "enemy" by soldiers wearing a broad band of signifying cavalry; blue, artillery; and red, infantry. The scouts will be represented by bicycles, and machine-gun emplacements by bicycles. A hot meal will be served to the battalion from the field kitchens at 12 noon.

REGISTRATION FINISHED

Registration of voters in Northwest Toronto proceeded in a manner which the organizers describe as fairly satisfactory. Up to Thursday evening 252 names had been enrolled and yesterday there were a few more. The registration closed last night and the number of names added is considered quite large.

DAVIDSON FINDS NO WRONG DOING

Report Made on Sale of Ammunition and Purchase of Submarines.

ERRORS DUE TO HASTE

But No Evidence of Intent to Secure Undue Profits is Unearthed.

Ottawa, Jan. 5.—The first instalment of Sir Charles Davidson's reports upon the war contract investigations he has conducted has been given out. There are some general observations and specifications in two cases—the sale of small arms ammunition to Vickers, Limited, for the admiralty, and the purchase of the outbreak of the war of two submarines for service on the Pacific Coast. In neither case does the commissioner indulge in condemnatory language. Regarding the acquisition of two submarines, he entirely commends the transaction as in the interests of public safety, finds that there were no commissions, and lauds the intermediary part played by Sir Richard McBride, as dictated by patriotism and the act of an honourable citizen.

Result of Sale

Respecting the sale to the admiralty by the militia department of three million rounds of defective ammunition at \$20 per thousand, Sir Charles finds that the transaction would not have taken place had it not been for the urgency of war conditions. He says it might better have been sold direct to the admiralty than thru intermediaries, while it should have been authorized by formal order-in-council. At the same time, he states that while there is evidence of \$45 being mentioned as the ultimate price to the admiralty, the account is still open for adjustment, as claimed by F. Orr Lewis, representing Vickers, Limited, whose head, Sir Trevor Dawson, acted for the admiralty.

Admiralty's Affair

"The sale," says the commissioner, "was made to the admiralty thru its own official, and paid for out of imperial moneys. It would be an unwarranted intrusion were I to pass judgment on domestic arrangements between the admiralty, its agents and its sub-agents. Dealing with the entry of Western Allies into the transaction, the commissioner says: "It is not improbable that the knowledge of the acquaintance between Sir Trevor Dawson thru Hughes.
