"I was fearful when I commenced my collections that I should not approach the sum collected last year; but at the close I see I have gone beyond it. This fear arose not because I was apprehensive that those of my flock who have hitherto given regularly and cheerfully, had become cold and lax in aiding the funds of our noble Society: but owing to the total failure of the Mackerel catch last Fall, which was a great disappointment and loss. Many severely felt it. When they complain, my motto to them is, "God will provide." I suppose, as there are so elsewhere—and many, and I must include a goodly number of my dear Sunday School children give cheerfully: while there are others that, if they give, do it grudgingly: not a few do nothing."

"Besides sending this sum to the Society, all who have pledged to pay our younger Brother in the Ministry, the Revd. W. E. Gelling, his stipend, will, I have no doubt, do so."

"You will rejoice with me when I tell you, that he has quite won the affections of the chief part of my people. His plain and friendly manner and kind disposition have thus endeared him to them,—and what is infinitely more, his spiritual advice and pulpit appeals for them to lead better lives are, I trust, a convincing proof he does not wish to live among them in vain."
