Grape fruit and oranges have arrived from J. S. Gibbons' Florida grove.

A leak in the water pipe is reported at the North End nearly opposite the Union Hall.

The English mails from the S. S. Teutonic which arrived at New York yesterday will be here tomorrow.

Dr. G. A. B. Addy will entertain the members of St. George's Society at the rooms of the organization tonight.

The St. John Clearing House reports the bank clearings for the week to be \$1,709, 113 and for the corresponding week of last year, \$1,411,696.

The rector having sufficiently recovered the Women's Bible class of St. John's (stone) Church will be held as usual on Friday afternoon at 2.45.

The schooners Clayola, Ravola, Arthur M. Gibson, Lavonia and Invictus, arrived at Shelburn, N. S., yesterday. The latter vessel having lost her deck load.

Norwegian steamer Tallman, Captain Olsen, of the Cuba line arrived this morning from Boston. She is berthed at the Corporation pier taking in cargo for Havana.

Repairs to the east side ferry toll house which have been under way for some time are now about completed and a marked improvement is noticeable in the building.

The police were called into McKinnon's beer shop, North End last night to quell a disturbance two drunken men were making. In the scuffle the store was knocked down.

Detective Killen arrived from Sackville last night, to which town he escorted Robert D. Harnay. Harnay's preliminary examination will commence tomorrow. The detective will not testify.

Last evening Rev. G. M. Campbell delivered an excellent and inspiring lecture on the North West, in St. Stephen's church school room, and vocal solos were beautifully rendered by Miss Edith James and Miss Louise Knight.

The commissioners of the Great Marsh met yesterday and considered the plans for proposed improvements to the Marsh Bridge. Another meeting will be held today. It is probable the work will be commenced before spring, but temporary repairs will be made.

Mr. Justice Cassels, who was appointed to hold an inquiry into the conduct of affairs in the Marine and Fisheries Department and who has been holding the inquiry at Quebec, will arrive in St. John the latter part of next week and will open the inquiry at this port on Monday, Nov. 23.

Twenty-five young men, fifteen of the number being from St. John are taking the civil service examination now being conducted by W. S. Carter the school inspector in the Post Office building. On Tuesday the preliminary examinations were given and yesterday and today the qualifying examinations are being held.

E. W. Matthews, who is in Canada placing Lord Strathcona's "Vindicator Shields" in the public schools, will expect in St. John tomorrow and will meet Dr. J. E. Dick superintendent of education for the province, and discuss what steps shall be taken here. Mr. Matthews is also expected to address a meeting in the new Seaman's Institute on Prince William street, on the proposal to affiliate with the British Seaman's Institute.

The Collector of Customs at this port received the following telegram yesterday from Ottawa: "Important: Customs sheep, swine and goats including fresh hides and other parts thereof from Pennsylvania or which have been in Pennsylvania, within two months prior to arrival in Canada is prohibited. Shippers importing above animals and parts, must produce evidence to frontier collectors that they are not prohibited." Signed JOHN McDONALD, Com."

Ira White's horse attached to a road cart ran away on Douglas avenue yesterday afternoon. The vehicle collided with a telegraph pole with such impetus that it was demolished and the pole also sustained damage. The horse which continued on its way, injured some of the legs with the remnant of a cart trailing in the rear was eventually stopped. It was ascertained that the animal had received only slight injuries. The owner was absent when the horse bolted presumably becoming frightened at the approach of an electric car.

The government has taken prompt action to have the boulder near No. 6 wharf on the West Side, removed. Director Peters was communicated with this morning and asked for the assistance of the hoisting crew and the services of Dr. Ver Lahey, who has been working for the city, the government agreeing to pay all the costs. At low tide, about 2 o'clock this afternoon, the boulder was to be dynamited and the debris removed by John E. Moore's dredge. The harbor master was making arrangements to drag the boulder to see that there were no other obstructions.

FISH MARKET

The fish market has displayed much stability of late, there being only slight changes in the prices from week to week. For tomorrow's trade the following quotations will rule:—Haddock and cod, 5c per lb.; halibut, 15c per lb.; mackerel, 20c each; cod-steak, 10c per lb.; smelt, 10c per lb. and pickerel, 10c per lb. The usual prices prevail in the smoked and salt fish varieties. Haddock and cod are at present very plenty, though this abundance does not exist with other varieties of the fishy title.

The Toronto Principals' Association has adopted a resolution recommending that they be divided into three inspectorial districts and that a principal up-to-date school teacher be appointed inspector, the three inspectors to constitute a board of appeal in all school matters.

MONCTON HAS ITALIAN BANK

This branch will facilitate matters for foreign laborers, especially Italians, scattered all over New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, by sending and receiving of money to and from Italy, Austria-Hungary, Russia and Bulgaria, to make deposits at the different postal savings banks of these different countries—the firm will also sell steamship tickets for all important lines, buy and sell foreign money, put laborers to work, etc. The grocery end of the line is also an important factor. Here everything so dear to the Italian heart or stomach—will be kept, such as tomato sauce, olive oil, olives, Romano and Parmigiano Cheese, all kinds of Macaroni, etc. The firm will carry a wholesale and retail business and no doubt will have a large patronage.

POLICE COURT

A sextette of drunks confronted Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning. John O'Neill arrived from Grand Falls on Wednesday with the express purpose of procuring some treating apparatus. Thinking stimulants in the interior, a more adequate protection against the elements than garments to clothe the body, he proceeded to sample the local brands of "firewater." In order to leave O'Neill sufficient money to enable him to return to Grand Falls, where he has been employed on the G. T. P., a fine of only \$2 was imposed. James Harrington, an habitual offender, was fined \$8, or two months, and George Anderson, \$4, or ten days. Fred O'Neill, a young man, arrested for intoxication and obscene language on Main street, pleaded guilty to drunkenness, and the reverse to the latter allegation. WINTER PORT NOTES

C. P. R. steamship Empress of Britain, Captain Murray, the first winter port steamer of the season will reach here probably tomorrow evening. She has 33 first class and 212 third class passengers, with one or two exceptions all the passengers will land here. Steamship Tainan, Captain Neman, the first Allan liner of the season will be due here Saturday. She lands most of her 180 passengers at Halifax. C. P. R. steamship Lake Manitoba, Captain Evans, arrived at Liverpool this morning from Montreal at 9 o'clock. She comes to this port next trip. Allan Lane steamship Victoria, Captain Pickering, is scheduled to sail from Liverpool tomorrow for this port via Halifax.
