NEW YORK FINANCIAL BUREAU

New York, Oct. 8.—Several entirely new factors of marked importance came to light in the cotton market yesterday afternoon and bid fair to have a bearing on the course of prices today and perhaps for some time to come. The action of the market yesterday was such as to indicate a completely liquidated week, speculative long interest being at a low stage. The fact that the south shut up tight spot sales at the lower base bid by the mills, while in the cotton goods market forward advances were reported with bally ready to take extensive lines for forward delivery.

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There is every reason to believe that we shall have very active markets during the next few weeks and that any fresh money looking toward low prices will be substantially absorbed by the south. However, as the season of the year extreme caution is advised so far as heavy commitments are concerned at this time. The south side, until more is known of the crop size, short sales should be made with great care.

Mayor, Deputy Sheriff, Police and Others Indicted for Action Against Federal Officer

Davenport, Iowa, Oct. 8.—Mayor Oliver Ingledue of Marshalltown, Iowa, Deputy Sheriff Chas. Naason, Samuel Winger, assistant chief of police, Michael Clark, police sergeant, Goddard, Patrolman Matthew D. McGowan, and Frank Hays and Leon McNamara, a bartender, all charged with conspiring to prevent a federal officer from doing his duty, were indicted by Judge McGowan of the federal court here, under bonds of \$1,000 each to appear for trial at the next term of federal court in Des Moines. The defendants were given till Monday to furnish bonds at Des Moines. Mayor Ingledue and the others were indicted by a federal grand jury at Marshalltown. They are charged with throwing Everett E. Van Wert, a special officer of the United States Indian service into jail at Marshalltown and keeping him there more than twenty-four hours.
