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Warsaw Likely Lost Soon; And Probably Riga Also

Situation Regarded in London as Being Menacing—Germans Still Bringing up Reinforcements to Narew Line

London, Aug. 5.—The developments on the Russian front are discussed at length in this morning's newspapers.

A despatch to the Times from Petrograd, says: "During the last week the Russian have been doing their utmost to save Warsaw, more for the sake of the Poles than for their own strategic advantage."

The Petrograd correspondent of the Daily News, who expects that the German main blow will be delivered between Warsaw and Lvograd, says that the situation in Warsaw is calm.

Although Warsaw has occupied the main public interest during the last fortnight, most of the Petrograd correspondents insist this morning on directing attention also to Riga, which is almost equally important as an administrative centre in the northern region.

"What has been said regarding the danger to Riga," says the Times' Petrograd correspondent, "applies with equal force to Warsaw. The evacuation of the civilian population is proceeding, although it is still premature to say that the surrender of the city has been determined upon."

The Russian troops already are withdrawing beyond the river Tokau, within fifteen miles of Riga.
