Suit Against Zimmerman

Heinie Zimmerman, premier third baseman of the Chicago, and umpire batter, has been made the defendant in a suit for separation, begun by Mrs. Helen Chas. Zimmerman, of New York. Crucially abusive language and refusal to support are the grounds alleged by the nineteen-year-old wife of the baseball star.

Although the wife alleges "Heinie Zim" is paid \$7,200 a year by the Chicago National league club for his services at the third sack, she alleges he has not sent any money to support her in some time, excepting a \$3 gold piece, which he sent as a Christmas present for their infant daughter, Margaret. Mrs. Zimmerman says her husband is reputed to be "a good spender." They were married May 1, 1914.

Mrs. Zimmerman asks \$200 a month alimony and \$500 allowance for counsel fees. She said she had known Zimmerman since she was a child, and had hoped for a happy married life, but the romance had been shattered, she declared.

"This licking habit has got to stop," she said. "We have got to separate. Core he murders me. He likes the ladies, and I cannot stand it any longer." The suit is being heard before Judge Brady in the supreme court, Bronx county.

Joe Tinker in Trouble
Manager Joe Tinker of the Chicago left Wednesday for New York to answer charges brought against him by a New York street car conductor. The latter charges that Tinker's car knocked him down some time ago, and since then blood poison set in.

William Donovan, manager of the New York American League Club, announces that he has selected Savannah as the spring training site for the team. The players will report in New York on March 1.

Manager Smith Released.
New York, Feb. 3.—Harry T. Smith, manager of the Newark Club in the International League, was unconditionally released yesterday. Eddie Zimmerman, third baseman, will probably succeed him.

Magnates in Meeting.
President Barrow, of the International League, together with C. T. Chapin of the Rochester Club and O. P. Smith of the Providence Club, were closeted with Ban Johnson at the hotel Belmont in New York, Wednesday. Many wild rumors were in circulation as a result of this conference.

Larkin said he was in favor of keeping the International League on deck for a finish fight with the Federals in Buffalo.

Chapin declared that while he could not say a word as to the future of the league, he was prepared to go ahead. Barrow received permission from the National Commission recently to withhold all players' contracts until March 1, which is taken to mean that the International League men want more time to discuss the present crisis. Barrow is making a desperate fight to put new life into his organization, and he is receiving plenty of assistance.

Decision in Baseball Suit.
Chicago, Feb. 3.—Decision in the Federal League's suit against organized baseball, which, it was alleged, operates in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law, will be handed down no later than next Saturday. U. S. District Judge Landis, before whom the case was heard, made this announcement yesterday.

Diamond Sparkles.
Members of the Chicago Federal League club will leave for spring training at Shreveport, La., on March 6. Eight or ten of last season's players may either be traded or released. None of them, however, was taken from the ranks of organized baseball.

"Bert" Baumgartner, a semi-professional player of Cincinnati, has been added to the outfield squad of the Chicago Federals.

The sale of the Syracuse franchise in the New York State baseball league schedule is postponed until February 23. Owners of state league club did not want Syracuse to join the International League.

Harry Fritz, utility third baseman of the Chicago Federal League club, was sold to the St. Louis club of that league on Saturday. Fritz was with the Philadelphia Athletics until he signed with the Federals in 1913.

AQUATIC
200 Mile Canoe Race.
The trustees of the Graham Brown Two Hundred Mile Canoe race trophy have decided to hold another race this year.

It will probably finish at Ottawa because the cup is held there at present. Percy Smith, head of the board of trustees, stated in Montreal on Wednesday.

"At our meeting held yesterday the trustees first were doubtful whether in view of the war the race should be held. After much discussion, however, it was decided that it was no part of patriotism to drop everything in sport, unless such sport interferes with recruiting. The two hundred mile race does not, and it is considered to be the better part of patriotism to treat the race as if there were no war."

League Broken Up.
The Eastern Professional Hockey League was short lived and today we got notice of its death. Glace Bay was not getting the best of patronage, her men were well paid and therefore she could not stand the pace. Last week when the Bluenose team was in Sydney a meeting was held of the league promoters. Glace Bay then expressed intention of quitting. Up to this time New Glasgow was getting \$75 from the Sydney players for every trip she made to Cape Breton, New Glasgow then offered to let Glace Bay have this \$75 guarantee, and later, too, in an attempt to keep the league going New Glasgow offered an additional \$20 out of her own pocket, but word was received this morning from Glace Bay that the hockey league had gone to smash. It may be possible that the team will go to Halifax and play several exhibition games there, as the Halifax fans are now abstinent for some pro. hockey.

May Purchase Valuable Stallion.
The province of Nova Scotia is likely to import at an early date another big class standard bred trotting stallion.

Some few years ago the government paid \$15,000 for Achilles (2:15 1-4), and it is said that the purchase of another traditionally bred trotting stallion is under contemplation. It is said that \$25,000 was the price placed on Axtion (2:07 1-4) by his owner, in Illinois.

Present indications point to a quiet season in harness racing in Nova Scotia. The stalls at the Halifax track are now occupied by horses purchased for the British remount department. Many of these animals are sick with all sorts of horse ailments, the conditions being such that it is doubtful if the stalls at the track will be fit for occupancy even after being disinfected, and they may have to be burned down and replaced by new structures. The Halifax track is also said to be in bad shape.
