Ottawa, May 20—Langemarck casualties are still coming by cable although the battle began just a month ago. Of the 6,500 Canadians stated to have been killed or wounded or captured at Langemarck there have been 5,181 names cabled so far. Of these 714 have been returned as killed, 3,351 wounded and 1,116 missing. There are still more than a thousand names to be forwarded, most of them, it is thought, will be reported missing. It is hoped that the last of them will have been reported by the end of the week.


